

Black Hawks Figure Tonight's Game Will Make Or Break Them

CHICAGO, (CP)—Chicago Black Hawks figure Tuesday night's game against the bruising Montreal Canadiens will either make or break them as far as hockey's Stanley Cup is concerned.

A win would tie the best-of-seven semi-finals 2-2 and give the Hawks a terrific boost before leaving for Montreal to finish out the series. After dropping the first two games, the Hawks scored a sensational 2-1 overtime victory Sunday night.

When the Hawks won Sunday, it was our first playoff victory over Montreal in 11 matches stretching back to 1944. Johnny Gottselig, assistant Hawk general manager and former player-coach, said, "The jinx now has been broken. Our club was given a big moral boost. The momentum of our winning will carry over to Tuesday night."

The veteran Gottselig sees the Hawks going all the way to take the playoffs from the Canadiens if they can win Tuesday.

"If we win, I think we'll have at least a 60-40 chance to beat out Montreal even though we must play our next two games there. If we lose, the odds against us winning the playoffs will be about 70-30. Coach Sid Abel expressed complete satisfaction with his team's play.

Seldom have Chicago's hockey fans been any more thrilled than they were Sunday. Bill Mosenko tied the score 1-1 for the Hawks with less than two minutes of regulation time left. Then Al Dewsbury drove in a blistering 30-footer at 5:18 of the "sudden death" overtime for victory.

Boston Hockey Fans In Dither Over Success Of Team Against Detroit

BOSTON, (CP)—Boston hockey fans are in a dither because their Bruins engineered a 2-1 overtime win over the classy Detroit Red Wings Sunday to take a one-game lead in the Stanley Cup semi-finals.

They weren't talking much but many wondered if the upset of all upsets was in the making, over the Bruins win the Stanley Cup.

The Bruins, from president Walter Brown, general manager Art Ross, coach Lynn Patrick on down to the stickboy, had only one thought—"let's take these games one at a time."

The Bruins, no doubt had in mind, as did their rosters, that the Wings thumped Boston nine times in 14 games over the regular season.

The best the Bruins could gain was two victories and three ties in that series.

And when the Wings, who won the National Hockey League title for the fifth consecutive time, walloped the Bruins 7-0 in the opening playoff game, Bruins supporters figured it was more or less the same. But then the Boston club came back and beat Detroit 5-3 to even the best-of-seven series at 1-1. Bruins supporters perked up a bit. It was Boston's first Detroit triumph since Nov. 1, 1951.

On Sunday night, Jack McIntyre sent them all home happy by slapping in a backhander at 12:29 of a sudden-death period. Players of both teams were reported in good shape.

The Bruins' Johnny Peirson and Joe Klukay had a little heat treatment for sore backs. The Wings' Marty Pavelich also had a heat treatment for a bruised side. All will be ready for Tuesday night's game.

Detroiters gave grudging credit to the veteran Woody Dumart for shadowing the Wings' great Gordie Howe.

Howe, the league's leading scorer, has been blanketed in the series while Dumart was on the ice.

Howe, who will be 25 Tuesday is probably the strongest player in the league and Dumart, at an official 36, has been shelved at the start of the last three seasons only to turn up each spring as a Boston standout in the playoffs.

Stassen And McCarthy In Hot Battle

WASHINGTON, (AP)— Mutual security director Harold Stassen Monday angrily accused Senator McCarthy of interfering with U. S. foreign policy by negotiating an agreement with Greek ship owners to halt trade with Red China and North Korea.

Far from being abashed, McCarthy retorted that he is going ahead with plans to sign a new agreement—this time with Greek owners of ships flying the British flag.

In a heated face-to-face debate, recorded over a television hookup, Stassen bluntly told McCarthy that his tactics are "undermining" the Eisenhower administration's own efforts to reach international agreements barring the shipment of war potential materials to Iron Curtain countries.

"I wouldn't take your word for it," McCarthy snapped back.

At another point, the Wisconsin Republican told Stassen: "The committee accomplished what you and Secretary of State Dulles did not accomplish."

The joint board was determined to have a United States champion.

Turpin, Humez Signed For Title Bout

LONDON, (AP)— British promoter Jack Solomons Monday announced the signing of England's Randy Turpin and France's Charles Humez for a "world" middle-weight title fight in London, June 9, but he received no support from American boxing commissions.

"European title yes, world title no," said Bob Christenberry, chairman of the New York State Athletic Commission who also heads a joint board made up of himself and two National Boxing Association officials.

Solomons hasn't yet received approval of the 15-rounder as a "world" title bout from the British Boxing Board of Control.

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Hudson Calls For Fast Decision In Hockey Case

Resignation Is Confirmed

Following are the copies of telegrams exchanged between C. S. MacAlden, secretary treasurer of the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association Monday night to reach a decision on the tangled league semi-finals or the MAHA "may well be responsible for the death knell of major hockey in the Maritimes," major hockey in the Maritimes.

He made the statement in a telegram to Walter Lawlor of Charlottetown, MAHA president, vice president of the M. M. H. L. The first telegram was addressed to Major T. B. Rogers and reads:

"At request of two clubs President Hudson has called M. M. H. L. meeting for Tuesday, March 31 at six p. m. at Lord Nelson Hotel, Halifax."

The reply from Major Rogers reads:

"My resignation should have reached you by now. I won't have anything to do with such a body which voted as it did Sunday. My opinion after three days of wrangling is that it would be better for Islanders to take up pen-knuckle than attempt to win a hockey title from Nova Scotia."

The regular best-of-nine semi-finals which Charlottetown Islanders won from Glace Bay Miners Saturday night, were washed out at a league meeting Sunday afternoon at the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association ruled that Erwin Grosse, a Charlottetown import, was ineligible.

The league ordered a two-game total-goals series between the two clubs. Charlottetown protested the decision and the MAHA upheld its appeal without presenting an alternative proposal.

Mr. Hudson earlier Monday wired MAHA secretary-registrar Charles Campbell of Glace Bay that when the association allowed an appeal from a league decision "it is its duty to decide what course of action is to be taken as any other decision of the league is as likely to be appealed and allowed as the present one and this could go on indefinitely."

The league president asked a definite MAHA decision by Monday night, either supporting the league decision or proposing an alternative.

Mr. Hudson in his later wire to Mr. Lawlor, said he had received no reply from the MAHA up to 9:30 p.m. AST. He continued:

"It is absolutely ridiculous when the MAHA allows an appeal, it does not state what is to be done in the case."

Meanwhile the semi-finals remained in suspension. The first game of the home-and-home series ordered by the league to be held at Charlottetown Monday night, was not played.
