Several pupils from Bedeque school are writing the matriculation examinations in Summerside High School.

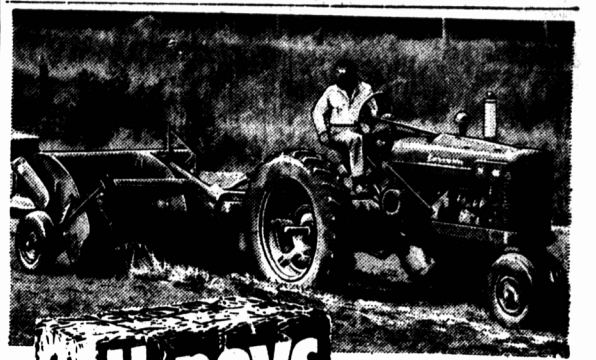
