The Shepherd's Calendar—December

For April lambs put the ram out on mid-November. Dust the sheep with a 5 per cent D.D.T. powder if external parasites are present.

Mendable but of little value if the milker uses a dirty milk pail or loosens a piece of manure from the cow's flank into the milk pail.

In swine husbandry it is important to remember that sanitation and proper feeding is one of the key notes to successful raising of pigs.

Snake out of hibernation — A small grey-black snake with orange belly was uncovered in a plowfield on Saturday by Weldon Hutchinson at Belle River, much to the young lad's surprise. (Snakes usually hibernate at this time of year). The discoverer brought the ribbon-like reptile to The Guardian office in a glass jar and it was later identified by Professor T. M. Lothian, biologist Prince of Wales College, as a Storey's snake, not very common on the Island, but quite harmless. This snake, which was about eight or ten inches, was missing part of its tail and was very thirsty, said Prof. Lothian who examined it. He said it would be kept in the College lab for a time and possibly it will be used for recording purposes at the National lab, Ottawa.

We And Our Neighbours

FAMILY COUNCILS and "GRIPPE SESSIONS."

From time to time it is a good idea to examine the over-all relationship between you and your children, rather than to narrow it down, for example, to a consideration of spanking versus putting in a corner.

Are your children relaxed and responsive? Do they come without fear, to you, the parents, and talk over their adventures—and their mistakes? Do they regard you their father and mother, as loving guides rather than strict bosses?

Of course in every home, there are moments! There is tension and irritation, and perhaps even unjust punishment. But if your home is warm and friendly and encouraging most of the time, the chances are your young people will grow up as you wish.

One family, in particular, the Aberys, were the wonder of their numerous friends and acquaintances. There were five children and only a small income, but the older children were going to high school, and money was being put aside every month for their college education.

The secret? Father, mother and children worked together to make the most of every penny and to utilize every ability present in the members of the family.

At weekly family councils, parents outlined not only the daily routine, but the special work to be done during the week. For instance, during canning season, so many cans were to be put up. Another time, a room needed painting, or a chair upholstered, or curtains gauds called for special preparation.

There were volunteers for definite jobs in connection with these activities. The nature of the job and the name of the volunteer were posted in the assigned corner of the kitchen. Even the child too young to read, was delighted with a picture showing scattered toys and a neat box. This was to re-

mind him of his responsibility for the week.

These weekly meetings took careful planning by the parents, but how much friction they prevented; how many idle words! Most constructive of all, the practical lessons in taking on responsibilities and carrying them through, were invaluable.

I was present at several of these family councils and once asked, "Suppose Teddy here offers to do a job then forgets or shirks?" One of the older boys settled ten year old Teddy on the shoulder and said, "Teddy can't forget because it is written down and posted for a whole week—and anybody can have a lazy spell once in a while. But if you know that the others already have a job, you don't like to give them an extra one."

Rules and regulations for school study, social activities, and other outside projects were also worked out in these meetings. They were popular young people, leaders in school and church and various organizations, yet there seemed time for everything in their happy lives.

Family "grippe sessions" (mentioned last week) can also help in building desirable parent-child relationships. They take much less time or planning than family councils, but can do wonders to heal hurts, air grievances and give a child renewed trust in his parents.

"Daddy," I heard seven-year-old Peter say, at a "grippe session," "you scold me when I forget, but you promised to take me for a long drive on Sunday, and then you went off before I could get ready." "Daddy expressed sincere regrets and said he would try not to scold Peter in the future, for forgetting. Perhaps it would be a good idea, he suggested, to remind each other, or to tie a string around each other's finger, when something had to be remembered. A good hug, followed by a manly hand shake, sealed the bargain.
