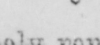

MAY 4, 1880.

FRANCE has reduced the duties on petro-
leum.

SEARCH for the sinking ship "Adanta"
has been given up.

At a riotous meeting of the Land League
held recently in Dublin, Parnell was rough-
ly handled.

A certain number of commissions in the
British Line regiments will be open to
competition by the Kingston cadets.

A cable has been laid between Singapore
and the Philippine Islands, and another is
to be laid between Cadiz and the Can-
aries.

The Ballot Act expires this year, and
the new British Parliament will be called
upon to discuss certain modifications con-
cerning it.

The Austro-Hungarian Ambassador's
position in England has become untenable,
owing to his having spoken scornfully of
Mr. Gladstone.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.---It was announced
in the Senate on Friday, that Parliament
will be prorogued on Wednesday. The
Senate will sit no more.

MARINE.---Capt. P. A. Scott, R. N.,
Chairman Marine Board, will be in this
City on the 7th inst., to hold the usual ex-
aminations required of candidates for mas-
ter and mate's certificates of competency.

DRIVEN MAD BY MASONRY.---Richard Nell-
son, who has been employed in the Mansion
House, Hamilton, for 8 or 9 years, and is said
to have been a sober and industrious young
man, has gone crazy on Freemasonry, and will
be taken to the asylum.

A boy in Philadelphia, supposed to have
had a well defined case of hydrophobia, has
almost entirely recovered. He suffered ex-
cruciatingly for several weeks, barking like
a dog, and showing other well known symp-
toms.

MATHEW THOMPSON, aged 12, hanged
himself in Patterson, N. J., on Friday, be-
cause his brother whipped him. Several
younger children were in the room when
the deed was committed, and thought he
was playing.

POTATOES.---Potatoes are unprecedentedly
cheap in Chicago for this season of the year,
being quoted at 20c/25c per bushel. In
former seasons Canada used to export to
that city, but there is evidently no money
in it this year.

CHARLES KARON, aged thirteen years,
threw a stone at a brakeman on a Hudson
River freight train near Sixty-ninth Street,
New York, Saturday night, and was shot in
the neck, probably fatally, by the brake-
man. The latter can not be found.

REMARKABLE.---We have before us the
names and ages of a certain family in this
county, the totals of which are very remark-
able indeed. The parents, both living, are
aged about 86 years each. The family, of
twelve children, varying in age from 43 to 65
years, are all living also. The total years of
this one family is nearly eight hundred. Can
this be beaten?---Pictou Standard.

JOHN D. WHITE, a member of the Ken-
tucky House of Representatives, charged
Speaker Bizer the other day with favoring
dilatory legislation. The lie was passed,
and after adjournment the parties had a
rough and tumble fight in the State House
grounds, White getting the best of the
Speaker.

The young lady whom the Queen's
youngest son, it is said, going to marry,
is the Hon. Mary Baring, daughter of the
Dowager Lady Ashburton and of the noble-
man, we believe, who negotiated that
famous treaty or settlement branded as the
Ashburton Capitulation by which New
Brunswick lost so much fertile territory.
The Dowager Lady Ashburton is, if we
mistake not, an American by birth.

QUEBEC MORALS.---Says the Quebec Tele-
graph:---Society is full of gossip over the
separation of several well-known married
couples. In one instance, a mother has
cleared away from her husband, leaving
her children to be cared for by her better
half. A letter was found on her bureau,
the purport of which is that she leaves
"Home sweet home," for a distant clime.
There is a great deal of rottenness about
society in Quebec. Rev. Mr. Bray has pub-
lished an able article on society in Mon-
treal which is applicable to Quebec too.

IMPARTIAL OPINION.---The "Daily Ex-
aminer," a few days ago contained the
speech delivered in the Ottawa Commons
by Mr. McDonald of this village. It is ex-
ceedingly logical and argumentative and
shows that the author had mastered fully
all the details and points connected with
the important question. From what we see

tives from both King's and Prince Counties

due them for the determined stand they

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, May 1.

Earl Cowper has been appointed Lord
Lieutenant of Ireland.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 1.

Accounts from Armenia of distress pre-
vailing there is appalling in the extreme,
without timely relief be afforded, the whole
population must perish.

LONDON, May 1.

Rhys Bluskar Wongse, the King of
Siam's Envoy, is expected to arrive here
on the 5th May, to invest Her Majesty
with the insignia of Order of the White
Elephant.

Notwithstanding the Theological adviser
of Propaganda having decided against the
English Roman Catholic Bishops in their
dispute with the clergy, the matter is again
to be submitted to Cardinal Manning, be-
lieving that justice was not extended to its
former consideration at the Vatican.

FRANCE.

PARIS, May 1.

A terrible explosion, attended with very
great loss of life, took place at Panten, near
Paris, yesterday afternoon, in the warehouse
of M. Honaire, fireworks manufacturer. At
one o'clock, the inhabitants of the sur-
rounding district were startled by a loud
detonation, which shook many houses to
their foundation, and immediately after a
chaotic mass, in which men and masonry
were jumbled together, was seen ascending
amid flame and smoke. It is believed that
over 20 unfortunate persons have been killed
or dangerously wounded, but the confu-
sion is so great that it is impossible to
verify. Information of a second explosion
is feared, as a large quantity of gunpowder
is stored on the premises.

PARIS, May 1.

Prince Jerome Napoleon informed two
of his most intimate Councillors that
Princess Clotilda, his wife (sister of the
King of Italy), has at length consented to
return to him, and will shortly arrive in
Paris.

RUSSIA.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 2.

Russian fortresses at all of the most im-
portant strategic points along the whole
frontier, between Europe and Asia are to be
reconstructed and renovated, especially
those near the German, Austrian, and Rou-
manian borders. Kars is being entirely re-
constructed, and Baloun and Hebi are to
be made marine fortresses of the first rank.
It is perhaps a fact of some importance that
the distribution of Russian troops in the
Western Provinces of the empire is no
longer contradicted by the St. Petersburg
press.

The Golos, noticing the military map of
Russia recently published by a German
Captain Von Troeltsch, regards its partic-
ulars as absolutely correct, and only won-
ders at the omission of the German staff
in obtaining the requisite information. The
opinion apparently entertained by the Golos
that this distribution of Russian troops is
not at all dangerous to Germany, touches a
point on which the German Government,
there is reason to believe, begs to differ
from Russian diplomatists.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 1.

The Russian Government has received
information that China has solicited and
received the aid of numerous Americans
for her army and navy. She is also in-
creasing her fleet in the Pacific, which is
already known to be larger than that of
Russia, consequently the Russian fleet will
be largely reinforced. The government is
also considering the policy of reprisal upon
the privileges of Americans within Russian
dominions. The Czar has informed Mexico
that a reprisal of diplomatic relations
(through the Resident Minister, will com-
mence in July or August next. Already
very friendly communications have passed
between the two powers relative to joint in-
terests.

UNITED STATES.

BATTLE CREEK, MICH., April 30.

This evening a fire, which originated in
the laundry of the Potter House, destroyed
that Building, Williams' Hotel and a large
number of other buildings. Loss \$100,000;
insurance \$40,000. Help was asked of ad-
joining towns, who, no doubt, saved the
whole city from destruction. One man
lost his life, and several others were severe-
ly injured while jumping from the windows.
