Awarded international awards of \$2,500 plus tuition were J. B. Bews, Kingston, Ont., for study at Cambridge, England, and Mrs. Beatrice G. Lipinski of North Burnaby, B.C., for study at Cincinnati, O.

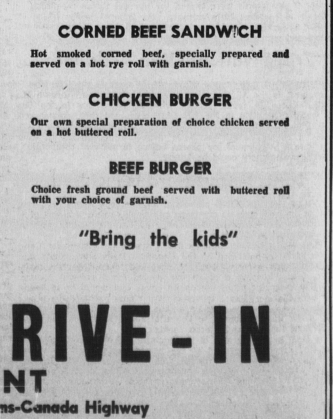
