## METHODIST CHURCH OF CANADA. Temperance Report.

The first report of Committee on Temperance was presented to the General Assembly on Thursday last. Its most important remarks were with reference to the plebiscite. "Recognizing the importance of the plebiscite vote previously taken," says the report, "the Reform party of the Dominion, in its convention of 1893, pledged itself if elected to power to submit the question of the prohibition of the liquor traffic to vote of the whole Dominion. At the general election of 1896 the Reform party was placed in power, and after some tedious delays brought down a plebiscite bill, and are now asking the will of the people. Efforts were made by the liquor party to complicate the form of ballot, making it much more difficult to receive a favorable verdict at the poll. But strong protests were offered, and our friends in the House of Commons, backed by the power of Christian sentiment, prevailed against their cunning artifice thus leaving the submission of the question to the people in the form most simple and easy to be understood."

The report went on to say that should a prohibition law be put on the statute books without an administration which would enforce the law, the result would be disappointing. It noted with pleasure that the House of Commons had ordered the closing of its bar, and regretted that the Senate had not followed its excellent example. It was earnestly to be hoped that the honorable members of the Upper Chamber would at the next session of the Senate bow before the force of Christian sentiment and abolish the bar of their Chamber.

—The Ottawa Free Press (government organ) publishes a letter from Dawson which is a telling indictment of the Yukon. It says Walsh and the gold commissioners got at loggerheads tells how very fairly they acted, and concludes by saying, "now that the ring has fallen out among themselves, the hard working miners may get a show."

—The Toronto Globe remarks that "four years ago the Methodist General Conference was highly commended throughout the Christian world for its departure from old lines of action in adopting a report of its committee urging the importance of cultivating the spirit of common brotherhood by personal contact, better acquaintance and a helpless one towards another. It is satisfactory to note that a similar committee has been appointed at the present Conference. Our Christianity is based upon the two great laws of love towards God and love for our neighbors. The present universal system of competition in business means the survival of the fittest, which is the same principle as governs animals. The longest teeth and the sharpest claws will always win, and if one wolf in the pack is weak or wounded the others tear him to pieces. In business circles if one man can drive twenty to the wall that one is applauded and considered great and clever. How few think of the sorrow inflicted on those who are ruined and on the ones dependant upon them. As church members are now holders of the great bulk of the world's values these questions present themselves in a way that they have never been presented before. It is a hopeful sign of the times that the great Methodist Church is turning its attention to them, and we look with great interest to good results from the consideration of such topics."

### Leiter's Wheat Deal.

CHICAGO, Sept. 10.—Jos. Leiter has cleaned up his famous wheat deal. Every creditor has been paid, obligations to banks whose assistance was enlisted have been cancelled and 14,000,000 bushels of wheat have been liquidated since the announcement of the voluntary assignment nearly three months ago. This has been done only by great sacrifice, including the giving of mortgages on property belonging to the Leiter estate aggregating \$5,800,000 in value.

## BACCARAT SCANDAL. A German Prince Humiliated and Two Officers Cashiered.

BERLIN, Sept. 10.—A painful scandal has arisen in one of the regiments of the Dragoon Guards, where the officers have been playing baccarat for high stakes of late. Prince Alfred of Saxe-Coburg lost £3,000, and Lieut. Goetze his entire fortune, in one sitting. A quarrel arose between the latter and another officer, which led to a challenge. The colonel of the regiment reported the matter to the Emperor. Angered by the disregard for his prohibition of gambling, Emperor William summoned Prince Alfred to his presence and ordered him to take leave of absence until Sept. 30th. The other two officers were cashiered.

A good deal of comment has been caused by the fact that Lieut. von Brusewitz, who was sentenced to three years and twenty days imprisonment for a duelling affair shortly after he had achieved notoriety by running a laboring man through with his sword for accidentally knocking against the lieutenant's chair in a cafe, has been liberated a year before the expiration of his term.
