FRANCE AND PEACE. Senate Read, ROOMS

Still Longing for Her Lost Provinces.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

PARIS, Aug. 30.—French newspapers generally distrust the practicability of the Czar's peace scheme, and clearly indicate that the French would make the restoration of Alsace and Lorraine a requisite of her participation in the conference.

Will Russia Yield.

LONDON, August 28.—The admiralty have been quietly preparing for weeks in the event of the Russia failing to give guarantees of the permanence of the British sphere of influence in the Yang Tse valley which is the basis of the practical British ultimatum now presented at St. Petersburg.

Experts here have little doubt that Russia will be compelled to yield under this heavy pressure. England's naval predominance is too palpable to permit any other course.

The Russian Minister.

LONDON, Aug. 28.—The Daily Mail's Peking correspondent says: "M. Pavloff, the Russian charge d'affaires in China, who has been appointed Russian minister to Corea, will be succeeded here by M. de Giers, who is at present accredited to Brazil. M. Pavloff's removal is generally attributed to Great Britain's sudden change of policy, the object of which is to press Russia with the advisability of recognizing our paramountcy in the Yang Tse valley."

"The Russian Government has been quite in accord with Great Britain's desire to delimit the matters of the sphere of influence, but when on the last Thursday it was asked permanently to respect the integrity of this sphere, it declined to give any guarantee. A prompt demonstration of the British fleet in the Gulf of Pe Chi Li, was a ready answer to this equivocation."

What Spain has to pay.

MADRID, August 28.—The Gazette gives the Cuban war expenses from January 1 to June 3, as 447,369,450, pesetas. [The peseta is worth about 20cents.]

The Spanish press is urging that the remains of Columbus be brought back from Havana to Spain, and that a provision to such effect be inserted in the final terms of peace.

Insurgents Fighting in the Suburbs.

GERMANY AND ENGLAND

To Work Together in Regard to China.

LONDON, Aug. 30.—The Berlin correspondent of the Daily Mail says that Germany and England are trying to formulate a policy to counteract Russia in China.

BRITISH GRIP ON EGYPT.

Rival Nations Powerless to Loosen it.

The Paris 'Soliel' in an article in which the steady and methodical progress of England in Egypt is remarked on, concludes: "Who can put obstacles in the way of the vast designs of England? Russia? She has enough to do to finish the Trans-Siberian Railway, to absorb Manchuria, to consolidate her position at Port Arthur and in Chinese waters. Egypt does not interest her. Germany? She is occupied with furnishing Krupp cannon to Turkey, as well as rifles and officers to reorganize her army. She will also get a naval station in Syria, and take from us our privilege of protecting the Christians of the East. Germany has no direct interests in Egypt. France? She has no time to devote to Egypt, to the Christians of the East, or to the Grand Turk. She has the Dreyfus case."

OPALS

INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE

Considering the Behring Sea Question.

QUEBEC, Aug. 30.—The Commission had the Behring Sea question under consideration yesterday. It looks as if Canada will consent to the prohibition of pelagic sealing, but the price to be paid is not yet determined.

THE CZAR'S PROPOSITION.

Opinions of French and English Press.

PARIS, Aug. 28.—The Figaro believes that the conference will assemble, because the Czar would not have risked a refusal. It believes, however, that the aspiration is chimerical.

Le Journal thinks the conference, instead of realizing the Czar's hopes, will rather accentuate national antagonisms, if it does not lead to demands totally inimical to the object of the conference.

LONDON, Aug. 29.—The Daily Chronicle's Paris correspondent declares that the disarmament olive branch would have emanated from Emperor William in Jerusalem if the Czar's advisers, including perhaps M. Honotaux, had not forestalled the Emperor's project.

The Daily News says: "If the Czar had not been, the Emperor would surely have been the dramatist. It is too much to hope for the realization, but some good ought to come of it in the way of a better understanding between the powers."

The Morning Post, discussing the difficulties in the way of the proposal, arrives at the conclusion that it would suit Russia's need, the Russian design, wonderfully well, but would not suit England at all.

A significant fact of today is Count Hatzfeld's continuous presence in London. He has been much closeted with Mr. Balfour at the foreign office. Germany's attitude in the present crisis is a matter of most vital importance. With reference to the sensational Chinese despatches to the Daily Mail and to a news agency here, it should be observed that the 'Times' Peking correspondent, Dr. Morrison, who has been conspicuously alert throughout, always getting information ahead of the foreign office, has thus far telegraphed nothing on the subject.

The appointment of M. Pavloff, as Russian minister to Corea would seem to indicate better relations between England and Russia, since M. Pavloff has been the active agent in all Russia's advances in China.

Liquor Dealers' Position.

OTTAWA, Aug. 28.—The position assumed by the licensed victuallers of Ontario to the prohibition plebiscite was explained by Provincial Secretary Dickey at a meeting of the trade here last night. He says that they are confident that the prohibitionists will not poll more than one-third of the vote recorded. The licensed victuallers, he said, believe that the financial aspect of the question will prevent a popular declaration in favor of prohibition. The prospect of being taxed to make good the revenue now derived from the traffic, will, in their judgment, prove the salvation of the business. The men in the trade have decided to do nothing in an organized way to meet the campaign of the prohibitionists. They were told that literature has been prepared and if they want it it will be forthcoming. But the trade in each centre is expected to pay for what it uses. The retailers think that the manufacturers and wholesalers, who get the lion's share of the profit, should provide the sinews of war for the campaign.

RUSSIAN LIARS

Russian diplomats hold that it is no disgrace or dishonor to lie in the most unblushing manner in order to promote the interests of their country and of their sovereign. When the late czar asked once of Count Ignatieff how he came to be nicknamed "The Father of Lies" while ambassador at Constantinople, he with a low bow responded, "In the service of your majesty."

Seamen Vote Ahead of Time.

Norwegian seamen are entitled to vote before leaving their country if the polling day is within three months of their departure, or they can vote at a foreign port within the same time by having their votes sent home through a Norwegian consul.
