Hockey Trades Helping Rangers In Their Drive

NEW YORK (AP)—The biggest National Hockey League trade in years that brought goalie Jacques Plante and forwards Phil Goyette and Don Marshall to New York, plus an unheralded transaction that netted forward Val Fothergill to New York, New York Rangers.

The Rangers, with 10 victories and two ties in their last 15 games, a four-place standing for the first time in three months, three straight shutouts at home and an average attendance of 14,000, are the hottest team in the NHL.

"Plante has been great," Murray Patrick, the Rangers' general manager, said Monday. "He's an intense player and keeps the boys on their toes all the time."

Plante, Goyette and Marshall were obtained from Montreal Canadiens in a seven-player trade last June. Goaltender Goyette and forwards Dave Balch, Leon Rochefort and Len Ronson moved to Montreal in the trade. Only Balch is currently with the Canadiens. The others are with farm clubs.

"Marshall was an early season disappointment," Patrick said. "But now he's playing like we expected he would. And Goyette has even exceeded my expectations."

Goyette has 16 goals and 31 assists for 47 points, a total which puts him well up among the top 10 scorers in the league.

Give Red Sullivan the credit for the way the team is going, said Patrick, referring to the Rangers' coach.
