Provinces Face Major Relief Accounting Job

OTTAWA (CP) — The provinces face a vast unemployment relief accounting job in the next month. For some it may be vaster than for others.

All 10 must determine how much unemployment welfare relief is required and paid out in their cities and towns so that a special committee of federal-provincial experts can decide where Prime Minister St. Laurent's formula for federal relief contributions will fit. Some provinces, it is indicated, have a fairly clear grasp of their relief situations. Others, however, had no idea at all and must start from scratch to encompass all the details.

The committee also must assess the impact of various tax-raising proposals on provincial economies; how much a national health insurance scheme will cost, and whether each province can afford to participate.

ONE-MONTH DEADLINE

The hope is that all the statistical information, at least on unemployment, may be gathered within a month. Once it is amassed, federal and provincial ministers—premiers in some cases—will gather here to reach a final decision on whether the St. Laurent welfare formula is to be accepted or rejected.

The unemployment and other statistical projects were discussed Thursday by a group of provincial deputy ministers at a meeting under chairmanship of Kenneth Taylor, federal deputy finance minister.
