DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Business in the House.

OTTAWA, Sept. 19. In the House of Commons the event of yesterday was the adoption of the Senate amendment to the Bay Chaleur Railway bill. The bill, as amended, passed without a single word of discussion.

The Chamber presented a forlorn appearance, half the members having left for home, and the furniture being upset as a consequence of yesterday's gale.

Prorogation will certainly take place by the end of the month. The business yesterday was unimportant, and the House adjourned at 11.

Nature Asserts Herself

Our Legislators Warned.

OTTAWA, Sept. 19. At one o'clock yesterday afternoon a furious squall of wind and rain struck Ottawa, uprooting trees, smashing windows and flooding the streets. The storm was worst on Parliament Hill. Slates were torn from the roofs and were hurled through the glass roof of the Commons Chamber, smashing five immense squares and littering the members' desks and the floor with broken glass, while rain came down in torrents.

STRIKE AT OTTAWA.

A Peaceable Demonstration.

OTTAWA, Sept. 19. The strike continues. Yesterday morning the strikers marched through the principal streets, numbering over four thousand men. All are orderly. The mill-owners have refused any concessions to the men. Outside relief has been promised, and the strikers will remain firm. Public sympathy is altogether with them.

Mercier Backs Down.

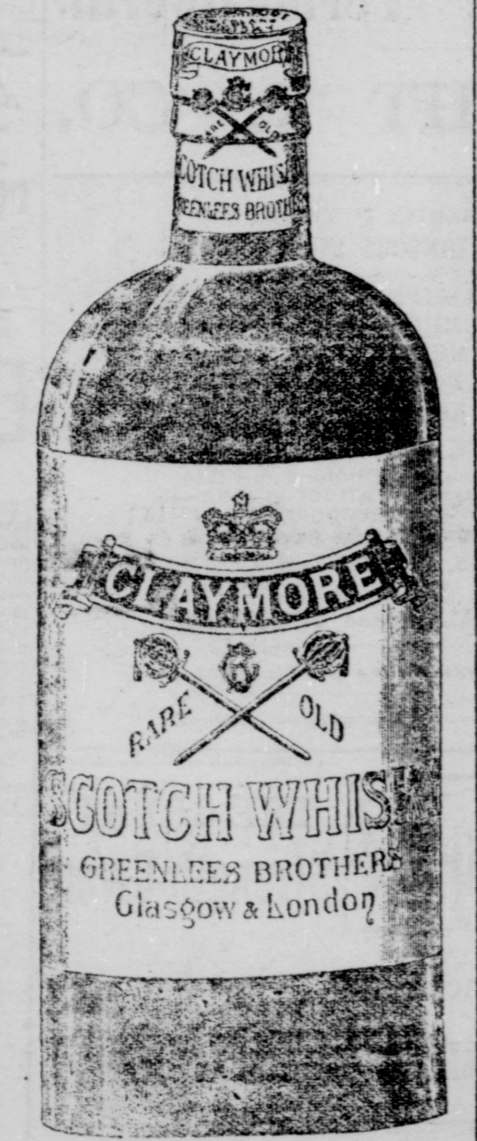
