

AN ELECTOR'S OPINION.

Sir.—Can you explain to us why Sir L. H. Davies is making a special tour through the Belfast and Murray Harbor District at this particular time? Is it not strange that his attention is not taken up with his own constituency, West Queen's? It seems that the sore straits in which the Local Government nominees in these two districts find themselves may be safely put down as the reason for this special trip. It is indeed a strange procedure for a Minister of the Crown, a member of the Dominion Government receiving over twenty-two dollars per day as Minister of Marine and Fisheries, to come down to take part in the provincial elections. One thing is plain; it is a great exhibition of the weakness of our present unpopular local government. Besides this it is being looked upon by the electors as insulting to our intelligence to be dictated to by a member of the present Ottawa government which government is only notable for having violated every pledge by which they obtained power. Mr. Davies need not think we electors do not read, and that we have not kept the run of public questions. We are only waiting the first opportunity of expressing our entire loss of faith in the present government at Ottawa, and we feel we are quite capable of judging in matters connected with our local politics without his dictation. The new Attorney-General will have to get more strength than Mr. Davies can give him to overcome the natural judgment of the electors of the Murray Harbor District, as we feel now that we have been deceived often enough. We suggest that he send for J. Israel Tarte who might be a source of strength, who while the blood of our English, Irish and Scotch soldiers is being mingled on the battlefields of South Africa in defence of our beloved flag, takes pride in the fact of being a Frenchman before anything else. It is time for us to be cautious of what we are doing; we cannot trust Tarte, Laurier or Davies any longer. Neither do we feel satisfied to accept Mr. Davies' advice or to support D. A. Mc Kinnon. We know our duty and are prepared to do it in man-fashion.

Lord Salisbury Explains.

LONDON, Nov. 16.—Lord Salisbury writes to the morning newspaper stating that Lord Fitzmaurice has inadvertently attributed to him language which he did not use. The passage on which Lord Fitzmaurice based his declaration concludes, referring to Lord Fitzmaurice's hope as to the eventualities: "I do not wish to discuss arrangements which, in circumstances that are yet in the future, the government may think desirable, but only to enter a protest against anyone assuming that the quotation of Lord Fitzmaurice is reported to have made was a correct representation of my speech."

The incident is all the more significant as Lord Salisbury is probably more indifferent to the remarks of his opponents than any public man in England. In fact he habitually ignores all such criticism. The letter refers to the phrase "We do not seek goldfields or territory" and is intended as a disavowal of the Daily Chronicle's interpretation that the government does not intend to annex the Transvaal.

SALVATION ARMY.—The well-known Self Denial Week of the Salvation Army will be observed by that body in Charlottetown from November 26th to December 2nd. Unusual activity has taken possession of the army's well-known energetic members in anticipation of this great event. The army's beneficent operations are maintained purely, by the free will of the people. The needs of its vast missionary labors among the heathen abroad and the downfallen at home are chiefly met through the agency of Self Denial. Officers and soldiers of all ranks deny themselves in order to help forward the work of the army. In this outside friends and sympathizers of the work are invited to join in gift or sacrifice.

BRAVE MEN.—The Summerside Farmer says: An act of bravery occurred at Egmont Bay last Monday morning which deserves public recognition. In the terrible storm of Sunday night the schooner Express, laden with shingles from Gaspe to Charlottetown, was driven before the wind her boat washed away and the vessel dashed ashore at Cape Egmont, close by a big rock called the "Dutchman," at about two o'clock on Monday morning. Despite the terrible sea that was running at the time, Messrs. Joseph Barriot and Maxime Arsenault, of Cape Egmont, put out to the rescue in a dory. After the greatest difficulty the brave fellows succeeded in reaching the wrecked vessel about 11 o'clock and rescuing Captain Stewart and the crew of four men. But for the action of the gentlemen named at their own imminent peril, the captain and crew of the Express would undoubtedly have perished.

An Ottawa despatch reports that "The department of fisheries is sending out a draft of the lobster regulations based on recommendations of the commission of this year." What's the use? An influential supporter or two of Sir Louis Davies' will easily obtain a suspension of any regulation that "doesn't suit."

The Government of this Province is not alone in its carelessness about "the most helpless of God's creatures." A despatch reports that "the Augusta insane asylum, a charitable institution supported by the State of Maine, is almost entirely out of fuel and its inmates are in danger of freezing unless a fresh supply can be had soon." Scarcity of coal is the excuse in this case.
