ROBBERY MOTIVE FOR MURDER

Mystery Car Being Sought in Connection With Slaying of Daniel A. MacDonald, Railway Bridge Carpenter and a Native of Tracadie Cross, P. E. I.

SEATTLE, May 17—Robbery has virtually been established as the motive in the MacDonald murder mystery and as a result Sheriff Matt Starwich today is tracing the automobile said to have been to the gravel pit near Ronald, where the body was unearthed on the night of Wednesday, March 15, when MacDonald was murdered, according to the official theory.

The gloves which were buried with the body are an important clue in the case, and one of the men under suspicion is known to have worn such gloves, according to the officials. But MacDonald himself, a railway bridge carpenter, is also known to have frequently been seen wearing white cotton gloves, so it is regarded possible that the gloves belonged to the victim.

Sheriff Starwich and Deputy Prosecutor John D. Carney have discovered that MacDonald was in possession of several hundred dollars when he was killed and the belief to have been the cause which prompted the murder.

Trailing the alleged murder car is proving a hard task for the officers because of the slender clues as to its identity.

MacDonald was seen alive the evening of Wednesday, March 15, officials have discovered. Sheriff Starwich, Mr. Carmody, Deputy Coroner T. F. Koepfl and Deputy Sheriffs C. S. Campbell, George Bandy and William Sears, who have been working day and night on the case, are closely guarding their source of information on this clue, and refuse to tell where MacDonald was seen, or in whose company.

Three Men Being Watched

Efforts are being made to connect the death automobile with the persons known to have been in the vicinity of the murder, it was the next day that workers in the gravel pit noticed the automobile tracks.

Machon's pen of Barred Rocks was 2nd, with 50 eggs; Mrs. R. G. McLaren's Barred Rocks were 3rd, with 46 eggs; Mrs. Bullitt's White Leghorns were 4th, with 47 eggs; and the pen of White Leghorns No. 20, owned by the Experimental Station, was 5th, with 46 eggs.

Mr. F. W. Woolley's pen of White Leghorns leads the contest, with 674 eggs to date; the Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 19 is 2nd, with 654 eggs; Mr. Everett Howatt's pen of White Leghorns tied with Pendleton Bros. pen of Barred Rocks for 4th place, with 584 eggs each.

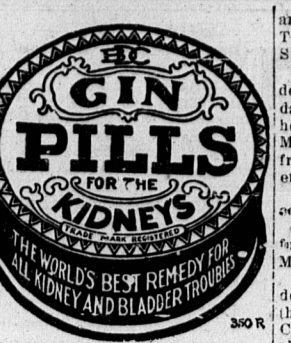

and was being closely questioned Thursday morning by Sheriff Matt Starwich.

A web of circumstantial evidence closed about Guth Thursday, following his return to his home from a trip to Tacoma. Most important links in the chain from which Guth is trying to exonerate himself Thursday are:

1. MacDonald gave Guth \$500 recently to invest in a chicken ranch.

Several others also gave Guth funds for investment, among them M. L. Packard, 2434, First Ave. W. 2. MacDonald had repeatedly demanded his money back from the attorney investment agent.

Correspondence found in MacDonald's room at the Rex Hotel included letters from Guth on the chicken ranch deal, declaring he was unable to settle for the debts at the time the letters were written.

3. MacDonald and Guth were to have appeared in superior court last Wednesday in a suit by the murdered man to recover his investment. Neither MacDonald or the attorney appeared.

4. Coroner W. H. Corson declared Thursday that, judging from the state of decomposition of the man's body, MacDonald was murdered last Wednesday.

5. Coroner Corson also declared that the man's head was beaten in by a jagged piece of rock, and that the deadly struggle took place near the pit, where MacDonald's body was found. The pit is only about 50 yards from the Guth home on the North Tracadie Highway.

Guth Thursday morning off the questions of Sheriff Starwich by saying that he had repaid MacDonald to money owed within the last few days, despite the fact that MacDonald was murdered more than a week ago.

Peuplies Frank Brewer, George Bundy and Ed Hughes located Guth when he returned to his home early Thursday. Guth was not arrested but placed under strict surveillance.

Sheriff Starwich declared that numerous complaints have been received of Guth's activities in investing funds for people with small amounts.

Movements of both MacDonald and Guth prior to the murder, and Guth's activities since the other's death, are being closely checked up by deputies.

The murdered man came to Seattle from Monroe, Wash., and formerly lived in Edmonton, Alta., Canada, where he owned property.

In Seattle he slept in a room at the Rex Hotel, 657, King Street. This room was found after the coroner recovered a room key and fountain pen that had been dumped into the shallow grave in the county gravel pit, where the body was hastily buried by the slayer.

Sheriff Starwich is of the opinion that MacDonald was murdered on or near the spot where the body was found by R. E. Stevens, foreman of a road-repairing crew. Stevens said he noticed the grave on Thursday, March 16, and that he
