LOUIS CHARLES WRIGHT

On the evening of March 1st there passed peacefully away Louis C. Wright, a well known and highly respected resident of this city. Although for the past four years Mr. Wright had been retired from active duties, nevertheless up till about a month ago he was able to share in the activities of the home, then he contracted the flu, from which he partly recovered until a sudden heart condition proved fatal. 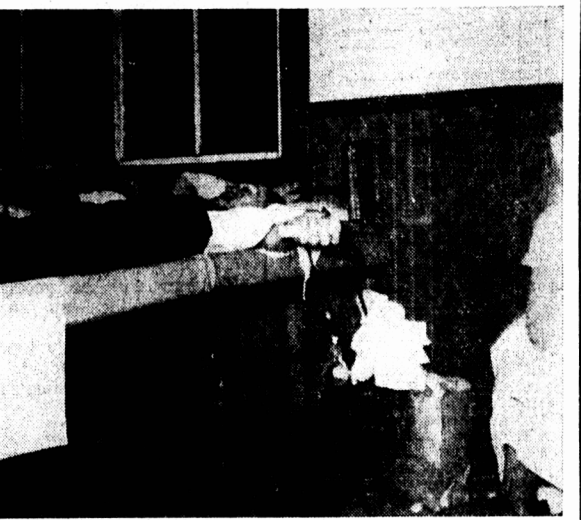

IN MEMORIAM GEORGE COLES

The many relatives and friends of the late George Coles, of Prince Edward Island, were sorry to learn of his death at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Charles Coles, Mt. Lehman, B.C., on March 12, 1951, in his ninety-fourth year. Born at Milton, Prince Edward Island, April 14, 1857, he was the son of the late William and Mary Anne (Aldridge) Coles, and was the last surviving member of a family of fourteen children. The early years of his life were spent on the island. In March, 1904, he and his family moved to the Canadian West, and engaged in farming at Pilot Mound, Manitoba.
