Opening lead—five of spades. There are no many confining rules you hear about which are supposed to guide declarer to the proper play of a hand that it is no wonder so many contracts are misplayed.

One school says that in no-trump you always develop your longest suit, another says you go after your strongest suit, a third school tells you to count your winners, another your losers; someone else suggests you finesse this way, still another says the other way, and so on.

All this advice though issued in good faith, is only of a general nature, and should be cast aside whenever following the usual rule appears to be harmful in dealing with an actual situation.

Nfld. Man To Appear For Fraud

GLOVERTOWN, Nfld. (CP) — Capt. George Glover of Hare Bay was committed Saturday to appear before a Supreme Court grand jury in St. John's on charges of forgery and fraud following an inquiry in this east coast Newfoundland town.

Capt. Glover is charged with misappropriating about \$11,000 in government funds. The money was intended to help residents of Bragg's Island and Deer Island move from their isolated homes to large and more central communities. The government pays up to \$400 a family when a whole community makes up its mind to move.

It is not known whether the families were actually moved by Capt. Glover, master of the coaster Sid and Eam.

Capt. Glover was required to enter no plea at the inquiry. Such inquiries are held to determine whether there is sufficient evidence to warrant passing a case on to the Supreme Court. The grand jury is not expected to sit before October in the fall session of the Supreme Court. If it returns a true bill against Capt. Glover he will make his defence before a Supreme Court petit jury.

Use Of Right Hand Restored

LETHBRIDGE, Ala. (CP) — Eric Clayton of Lethbridge once thought he would never again have the use of his right hand, left crippled by a childhood illness. But a weaving loom at the Rehabilitation Workshop for the Handicapped here has changed all that.

He was one of the first students enrolled for classes when the workshop was opened last year. The classes have given him and several hundred others the opportunity to learn that they are able to work in spite of their handicaps.

The Lethbridge centre, and others in Edmonton, Calgary and Medicine Hat, were set up with the aid of a 10,000 grant last year from the Alberta government, and support from public-spirited citizens and from the Alberta Association for the Handicapped.

Fire Fighting Aircraft Will Pick Up Water On The Wing

SUDBURY, Ont. (CP) — Bush fire fighting planes in Ontario may soon be equipped with water tanks that can be filled while the aircraft skims over a lake, says district forester William Cleaverly.

Low flying tank planes could control and even extinguish small bush fires in isolated areas. One department of lands and forests plan, an Otter stationed at Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., has been equipped with the tanks, one to each pontoon.

It can take on 180 gallons of water in just 18 seconds—without stopping. It skims along the surface of a lake, dragging a refill pipe through the water.

Over the fire, the pilot flips a switch and the tanks revolve and open to release their cargo. Baffle plates prevent the water from sloshing.

Maximum Payments Of Ont. Judgment Fund Will Double

TORONTO (CP)—Ontario's Unsatisfied Judgment Fund, designed to protect victims of uninsured drivers, will have been in operation 10 years on July 1. It has paid out more than 9,000,000 in claims.

Assistant deputy attorney-general Eric H. Silk says he believes the fund and its machinery are as near perfect as can be devised. "We have found that those who are inclined to criticize the legal aspects of the fund are people who do not have a proper working knowledge of it," he said.

Under present legislation, accident victims of uninsured drivers can recover up to 5,000 for personal injury and 1,000 for property damage from the fund, after a court judgment has been obtained. They have to prove that neither owner nor driver can pay. The maximum paid out in any one action is 10,000.

Drivers now pay \$1 into the fund when they buy their annual licences.

BOOST PAYMENTS Maximum amounts recoverable will be doubled, beginning in 1958. At the same time, uninsured owners will have to pay \$5 a year into the fund. "Since about 20 per cent of Ontario's car owners are uninsured, this may double the fund's income," says Allan G. MacNab registrar of motor vehicles.

A driver who has had debts paid by the fund is not allowed to drive again until he has paid back the amount, or had made arrangements to pay it on instalments.

Toronto lawyer Charles A. Thompson, Q.C. says he feels that victims sometimes settle for less than they should, when a settlement is possible, because of the difficulty of proving that the other party cannot pay. "The fund's discretion should be extended," he says.

The fund protects out-of-province victims injured in Ontario only if their province or state has similar protection for visitors from Ontario. All Canadian provinces except Quebec have comparable legislation.
