Legion May Sponsor Swimming Classes

NORTH RUSTICO—At the annual meeting of the Queens County zone of the Canadian Legion, Murray Cassidy of North Rustico, was elected zone commander for the coming year. He succeeds Hamilton Douglas of Mount Stewart. The deputy commander is K. M. MacLean of Victoria. F. P. Smith of Charlottetown was re-elected secretary. The zone rally expressed itself strongly in favor of Legion branches sponsoring swimming classes as a means of reducing the large number of drowning accidents each year. As one delegate to the rally, Birt Blacquiere, commented, "if through these swimming and water safety classes, one life is saved the whole program would be well worthwhile."

Plans were also announced for the promotion of tug-of-war teams from branches interested in displaying their strength at the Summerside Lobster Carnival. In reviewing the accomplishments of the past year, Mr. Douglas named some of these the securing of war veterans allowances for several veterans, the establishment of a ladies auxiliary to the Eldon Branch and a very successful zone crib tournament. North Rustico won the zone championship and the provincial playdowns are scheduled to start shortly. Delegates were present from Mt. Stewart, Charlottetown, Eldon, North Rustico, Victoria and Kingston. The rally was held in North Rustico.

Million Dollar Machine Shop Opened In Sydney By Dosco

SYDNEY (CP)—President A.L. Fairley of Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation presented "strong and tangible evidence" Wednesday that Dosco will continue to expand in Nova Scotia. Mr. Fairley said a \$1,000,000 machine shop addition to the steel plant here, opened officially Wednesday by Premier Stanfield, effectively answered critics who suggested Dosco intended to desert its holding in this area. "This is but a portion of our spending in Nova Scotia," he said at the shop opening ceremony. "We have spent more than \$5,000,000 in Cape Breton alone during the past year for new capital facilities, and I might strongly point out that there will be continued and substantial investment by Dosco in this province."

Named after long-service employee George Beaton, the machine shop provides 40,000 square feet of floor space concentrated under one roof and is equipped with hundreds of machines necessary to service the 4,000-employee steel plant. Structural steel was provided and erected by the Canadian Bridge Division of Walkerville, Ont., a Dosco subsidiary. Premier Stanfield called the shop "another big progressive step in the Nova Scotia steel industry, the greatest single industry in the province."
