STILL ANOTHER FIRE.—On Wednesday night last the people of North Lake were awakened from their slumbers by the alarm of fire. COURSE OF LECTURES BY PROFESSIONAL MEN.—We congratulate our good friends of Clifton, Park Corner, Malpeque and adjacent settlements, on the rich intellectual treat which awaits them during the coming week. We learn from a handbill placed at our disposal that a trio of gentlemen from Charlottetown, possessing speaking abilities of no mean order, have volunteered to give a "Course of Lectures" at the above places, viz: A. B. Warburton, Esq., B. C. L., at Clifton Court House, on Tuesday, March 6th; subject—"Scraps of Canadian History." D. C. Martin, Esq., M. P., at Park Corner, on Wednesday, March 7th; subject—"Washington." Whether this means the seat of government of the Great Republic or the first President of the country, doth not appear. In either case, however, we bespeak for the learned lecturer a full house. And last, though not least, Hon. Judge Alley will delight the hearts of the good people of Malpeque by delivering, at their Public Hall, on Thursday, March 8th, his able lecture on "Prince Edward Island one hundred years ago." These intellectual entertainments will commence as above each evening at 7.30 o'clock, and an admission fee of five cents will be charged. Proceeds donated to the poor. Supreme Court—Georgetown. The Court from Wednesday until Friday morning were engaged trying a case between John G. Scrimgeour and Owen Connolly. On the last mentioned morning the foreman of the Jury took ill and the case stood over until this morning. The Rape case was tried yesterday. It was given to the jury at seven o'clock last evening. The defence was an alibi. The jury returned to the Court several times reporting that they could not agree. The Court refused, however, to discharge them, and at midnight they returned with a verdict of Not Guilty. Patrick Cullen vs. Archibald McLean.—Mr. Hodgson, Q. C., for plaintiff, obtained a writ of Injunction against the defendant, restraining him and his servants trespassing and quarrying stone on the Mutch property, at Harbor's Mouth, Charlottetown harbor. The Counsel in the Connolly-Scrimgeour case are M. McLeod, Q. C. and E. J. Hodgson, Q. C., for plaintiff; and F. Peters and W. A. O. Morson, for defendant. The case will last over Monday.

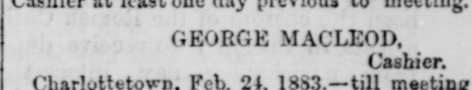
