

Queens County Meet Has Huge Success

The Queens County Inter-school track and field meet was staged at Victoria Park Memorial Field on Saturday. All schools were well represented and the spectators witnessed many thrilling finishes.

During the course of the days action six new records were set. Jack MacEachern set a new record in the boys' 100 yard dash with a throw of 30' 2" and Jack also set a new mark in the boys' 200 yard dash as he recorded a distance of 39 3/4".

Queen Charlotte High set a record for the mile relay as they reeled off a 3:07 time for first place in that event. The Birchwood team set a new mark for the quarter mile relay with a time of 50.2 seconds.

Lyall Huggan set the mark for the 100 yard dash in the senior boys division with a distance of 38 3/4".

Derby and Preakness, can join one of horse racing's most exclusive clubs next Saturday by capturing the 96th running of the \$125,000 - added Belmont Stakes at Aqueduct.

Only eight thoroughbreds have captured all three events, the last citation in 1948. The others were As a unit, 1946; Count Fleet, 1945; Whirlaway, 1941; War Admiral, 1947; Omaha, 1935; Gallant Fox 1930 and Sir Barton, 1919.

Northern Dancer, owned and bred by E. P. Taylor of Toronto, was the first Canadian-bred colt to win the Derby and Preakness. He can gain the same distinction by taking the Belmont, at 1 1/2 miles longest of the three races.

This little son of Nearctic-Norma is certain to be the choice over a small field. He

Derby and beat favored Hill Rise by a neck after a sizzling 24-second final quarter to capture a Derby record of two minutes flat for the 1 1/4 miles.

Hill Rise, from George A. Pope Jr.'s El Peco Ranch of California, again was made the favorite in the 1 1/4 miles of the Preakness. But this time he had to settle for third as the Dancer won by 3/4 lengths with the Scoundrel in the runner-up spot.

Hill Rise will be back The Scoundrel sold a few days ago by Rex Ellsworth to Kjell Gyalen of San Francisco for \$200,000, turned up with an injured left front leg Wednesday while preparing for the Jersey Derby and is expected to be out of competition for some time.

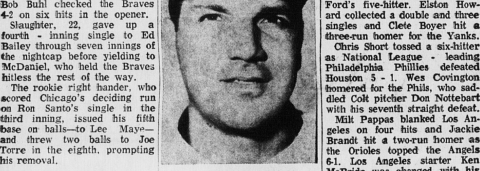

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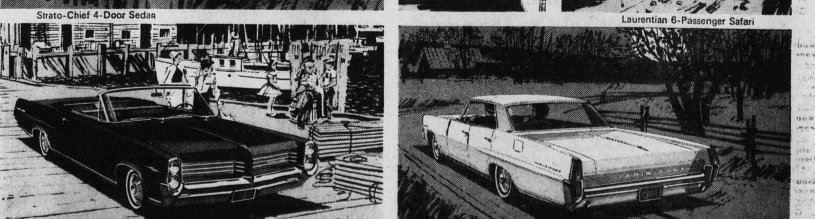
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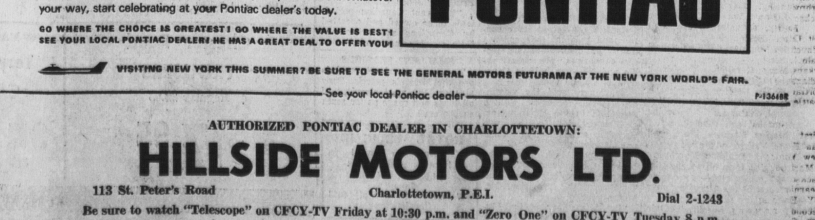
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
