

# Rangers Edge Canadiens 3-2

NEW YORK (CP)—New York Rangers, after scoring three quick goals in the first period, held off enough Montreal attacks to score a 3-2 victory over the Canadiens at Madison Square Garden Wednesday night.

The victory hoisted the Rangers into a first-place National Hockey League tie with the Detroit Red Wings. The Rangers took an early lead at 6:35 as Bill Gadsby took Red Sullivan's pass and scored, faking beautifully past Bert Olmstead. Less than a minute later Maurice Richard got his first goal of the season at 6:58 to tie up the game. Doug Harvey and Olmstead were credited with assists.

For the rest of the night, it was his 461st goal in NHL season competition. He brought his points total to 800. Both are league records, including playoff play. Richard has 523 goals.

Bronco Horvath added a second goal for the Rangers at 8:54 on a backhand tap.

**PENALTY SHOT**  
The Rangers' third and last goal of the night came on a rarely-seen penalty shot scored by Danny Lewicki. He zoomed in for the clincher at 14:37 after Doug Harvey had hooked Dean Prentice on the Ranger's clear shot at the goal.

Jean Beliveau ended the scoring for the night at 1:43 of the second period, beating goalie Lorne Worsley on a short jab from the left of the cage.

The clean but rough game started ominously as Ranger fans started a chant of "get Beliveau" during the first period. Beliveau claimed previously that Beliveau played "dirty hockey" in a New York Canadiens game at Montreal last Saturday. Beliveau got in a fight with Sullivan who suffered a deep cut which required four stitches.

**WANTED TO WIN**  
After the game Watson told reporters that he had said the Rangers were out to "get Beliveau," but "I shouldn't have said it." He said his team wasn't out to get the Montreal star centre but wanted only to win the game.

Coach Toe Blake of Montreal could not be reached for comment. The Canadiens played without two of their stars. Henri Richard, brother of Maurice, missed the game because of torn knee ligaments and all-star NHL goalie Jacques Plante couldn't play because of a bronchial infection. He was replaced by 30-year-old Gerry McNeil recalled Tuesday from Montreal Royals, the Canadiens Quebec Hockey League farm club.

Two Winnipeg Blue Bombers in Race For Scoring Honors  
WINNIPEG (CP)—Two Winnipeg Blue Bombers stars are racing neck-and-neck down to the wire in the individual scoring race in the Western Interprovincial Football Union.

Halfback Bob McNamara scored two touchdowns in Bombers' single game last weekend to get two points ahead of teammate Buddy Leake, who picked up five points on two converts and a field goal. All clubs except B.C. Lions have one game left apiece in the regular schedule. Lions have completed their schedule.

# Durocher May Be Tribes' Manager For 1957 Season

NEW YORK (AP)—Leo Durocher will meet with Cleveland general manager Hank Greenberg next Monday to discuss the possibility of his managing the Indians next year.

Both Greenberg and Durocher, now a television executive in Hollywood, disclosed they have had a couple of preliminary discussions.

The Indians are without a manager following the resignation of Al Lopez at the close of the 1956 season. Durocher has been out of baseball since he resigned as manager of New York Giants at the end of the 1955 season.

Durocher said while he had no idea what sort of proposition Greenberg had in mind, he would not be receptive to any offer unless he would be allowed to buy an interest in the club.

An NBC official revealed that Durocher was earning "close to \$100,000 a year."

Greenberg said Wednesday "I have two or three other candidates I'd like to talk to."

Kirby Farrell, who led Cleveland's Indianapolis farm team to an American Association and little world series championship this past season, is high on Greenberg's list. So is Eddie Stanky, former manager of the St. Louis Cardinals who piloted the Minneapolis club in the American Association last season.

Durocher spent 15 years as a big league manager, winning three pennants and a world champion ship.

THE TORONTO (CP)—The Canadian Championship stakes will have a total value of \$62,800 if 16 horses go to the post at New Woodbine Saturday, the Ontario Jockey Club announced Wednesday.

The owner of the winning horse will receive \$45,300.
