The S. S. Southcliffe Hall, 1171 registered tons, Canadian freighter, registered in Montreal, arrived in port at Georgetown, June 17, from Port Alfred, Quebec. She carries a crew of 24 men under command of Captain H. L. Davis. Yesterday she commenced loading a cargo of approximately 1400 cords of pulpwood, and after completion will sail for Erie, Penn. The ship is being loaded from J. A. MacDonald's pulpyards at Georgetown and Cardigan.

Extension of Federal Wildlife Management Urged by Conference

OTTAWA (CP)—The 18th federal-provincial wildlife conference has urged extension of federal wildlife management on a scale comparable with programs operating in the fields of forests and fisheries management.

E. S. Huestis, fish and game commissioner and director of forestry for Alberta, urged the concluding session of the conference to recommend amendments to present federal legislation to provide the provinces and Ottawa with a broader basis for co-operative wildlife management. There was general support for this proposal.

J. S. Jenkins, Prince Edward Island, said a broader field exists for the Canadian wildlife service than in the far north, national parks and the migratory birds regulations, to which it is confined at present.

Charles Lawrence, assistant chief, branch of game management, U.S. fish and wildlife service, said the Canada goose has multiplied to the point where its numbers have become a problem.

The question of whether white-tailed deer should be introduced into Newfoundland was discussed in a paper given by D. Pimlott of Newfoundland. Domestic fresh meat has always been in short supply in that province and wild meat has been staple for many Newfoundlanders in the past.

Golden Jubilee of Rev. James Donahoe

Father Donahoe, a native of Rosneath, P.E.I., was elevated to the holy priesthood on June 13, 1904, by one of the most outstanding members of the American hierarchy, Archbishop John Ireland of St. Paul, Minnesota.

In addition to having given distinguished service in the archdiocese of his adoption as archdeacon and director of Catholic Charities and as pastor of St. Bridget's Parish, Minneapolis, Minn., Father Donahoe is the author of two notable books, "Prince Edward Island Priests and The Scope of Charity."

In welcoming him back to his native Province, Father Donahoe's many friends will offer him warmest felicitations on this occasion, and wish him many more years of apostolic work in his sacred calling.

Former Glen William Lady Dies At Halifax

Word has been received of the passing of Mrs. Malcolm A. MacDonald, Connaught Avenue, Halifax, who passed away June 17, at the age of 70 years.

The deceased was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Roderick MacLeod of Glen William. She leaves to mourn besides her husband, a son Bruce of Halifax, a son Allister of Ottawa and a daughter Catherine, Mrs. Robert Jenkins of Halifax.

The remains are arriving from Halifax tonight and will be transferred to the home of Angus Matheson, Glen William. The funeral service will be held from the Murray River United Church, Monday, June 21, at 2 p.m. Interment will be in Caledonia cemetery.

Daylight Saving Time Discussed By Montague Town Council Last Night

"At the postponed regular meeting of the Montague Town Council held yesterday evening, the matter of Daylight Saving Time received considerable discussion. Present were Mayor Yeo, Councilors McGowan, Hessian and Fraser.

Following the lengthy discussion, it was decided that in view of the fact that the Town Council had already passed a motion to establish Daylight Time on April 25 to Sept. 25, it would let the matter rest there, until it was otherwise advised, and those who wished to go on Daylight Time might do so, and those who wished to remain on Standard Time might have the same privilege.

Some time ago a petition was circulated and signed by some 60 business men to have the Government place the whole Province on "fast" time. Yesterday Mayor Yeo read a list containing the names of business men of the town, some of whom were remaining on standard time despite the motion of the Town Council, two others were going on daylight time despite the Uniformity Time Act, and others were neutral, those to whom it did not matter.

Councillor Fraser made a motion that it be published that the

Town of Montague go on Daylight Time effective midnight Sunday night. There was no seconder, and the motion was withdrawn.

The general feeling prevailing was that the "fast" time should be Province-wide in accordance with the Uniformity Time Act. It was then decided that the decision would be left to each business establishment to resolve the question on its own.

Discussion also centred on making the Wood Island hill street a one-way street on Saturday night, and it was decided that the question would be given further consideration.

The Mayor reported that several quotations were received for the proposed sidewalk construction, and that further consideration would be necessary.

There followed a brief discussion on a proposed hydrant pipe line along the main street of Montague with a main pumping station at the wharf. Authoritative sources indicated a 3-inch pipe one half mile long on each side of the bridge would carry sufficient pressure for the hose lines. The estimated costs for installation of the line would be over \$9,000. However, it was decided to get more information before any definite decision was made.

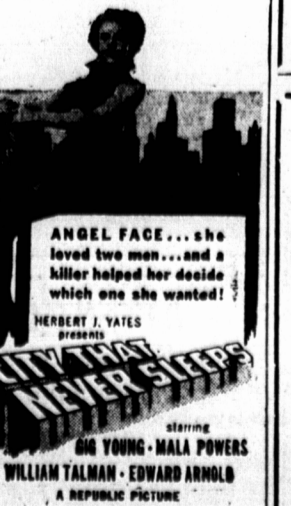
