POLICE COURT.—This forenoon the Scott Act summonses against Hugh Hennessey and P. S. Brown were dismissed. Charles Watling's case was adjourned. Peter Gillboy for breaking windows in A. Macdonald's store was fined \$20 or 2 months imprisonment.

HAS SLEPT THREE YEARS.—The doctors are greatly puzzled over the strange case of Chall, a farmer, two miles north of Mason, Mich., who has slept continuously for three years, except when awakened to receive nourishment and food. A few minutes is the longest time he can be induced to remain awake. He never awakes of his own accord, and unless awaked by someone, would undoubtedly sleep his life away.

A BIG MONTH.—The month of June, ending today, was the largest in point of business that the police court has experienced for years. In all there were fifty-three cases before the court. There were 32 convictions for drunkenness, 3 for assault, 2 for nuisance, 2 for malicious injuries to property, 2 for vagrancy, 1 for fast driving, and 1 for larceny. There were six persons sent up for trial in the Supreme Court, and 4 Scott Act summonses were dismissed. The receipts during the month amounted to \$130.25.

A STRANGE ACCIDENT.—Mr. Stewart, an employe of Mr. Dean of Rice Point, had a narrow escape from death on Saturday, the 26th inst. As he was ascending a steep hill on the Canoe Cove Church Road with a heavy load of lobster bait the wheels slipped from under his cart and horse and driver were thrown to the ground, the horse and cart-shaft falling across Stewart's leg and holding him fast to the ground. The horse was unable to rise and no house being in sight the distressed man could only hope for rescue by giving shouts of distress, thereby to attract the people of the neighboring village. John McNevin, the school teacher, first arrived to the rescue. He found himself powerless to release Stewart, but willingly sat on the horse's head and kept the animal from struggling. Stewart had to remain in his undersired position for fully fifteen minutes, when McFadyen arrived from the village and released the distressed man; in their excitement pulling him out of his boots. Mr. Stewart was none the worse for his experience and proceeded on his journey after getting his cart straightened up—Guar.

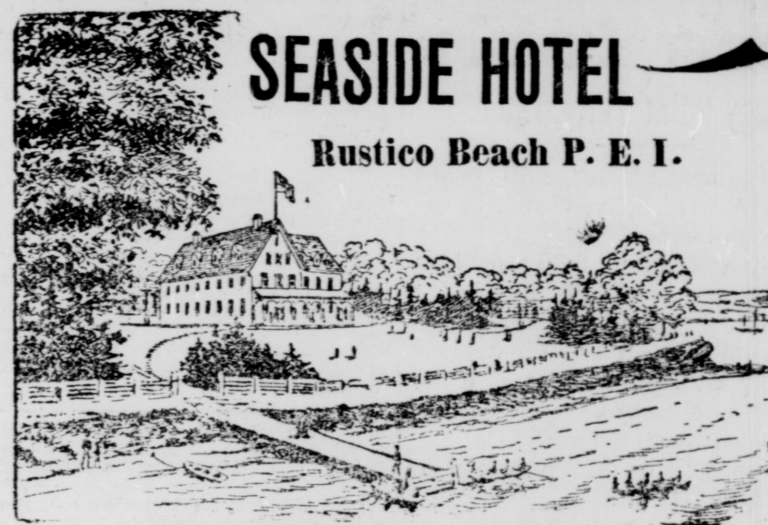
