Dr. Wilson, a dentist applied an external heart massage and Miss Woodward mouth to mouth resuscitation. She could finally detect breathing again.

Dr. Wilson believed the child had an excellent chance of making a complete recovery.

The near tragedy occurred last Tuesday, May 19.
