LOOK OUT FOR STORMS.—W. T. Foster, a St. Joseph Mo., weather prophet, is out with a prediction in the course of which he says that "one of the most severe storm periods of recent years will prevail over the United States and Canada, from March 7th to April 13th. In many parts of the country unusually heavy rains or snow will fall and floods may be expected. Seven principal low barometers, or storm centres, will cross the continent from west to east during the period mentioned. Tornadoes may be looked for in those parts frequented by these destroyers. Temperature will go to great extremes and frost will damage early crops far southward. Electric storms will precede and severe cold waves follow some of these. Those crossing the continent March 7 to 11, 12 to 16, 18 to 24, 25 to 28, and April 4 to 8 should be carefully watched.

TEMPERANCE MEETING.—We are requested to intimate that the Sons of Temperance have it in contemplation to hold a Mass meeting in this city, under the auspices of the Grand Division, on the evening of March 20th, inst. (D. V.) A Committee of the city Division has been appointed to co-operate with that of the Grand Division. A COIT-EATING WOLF KILLED.—The Moonshin Courier says: Joseph H. Lewis, of Nose Creek, near Calgary, killed a big prairie wolf which weighed 115 pounds and measured five feet eight inches from tip to tip. This wolf is said to have killed twenty colts this season and a number of young cattle.

BOSTON'S UNEMPLOYED.—Rev. Dr. Louis Albert Banks, in his sermon on Governor Greenhalge and some dangerous friends of the Boston poor, severely criticised the leaders of the late state house demonstration. He said: "The reckless spokesmen who misrepresent the real laboring men of Boston, who condemn the governor's action in such bitter language, owe him a debt of gratitude instead for saving them from what might easily have been a very serious famine from their folly. The most dangerous friends of the unemployed are the individuals who are stirring them by incendiary harangues to bitterness against their more fortunate fellow citizens, and feeding the fires of revolt against the limitations or safeguards of society. I know that hunger and cold are hard masters, but lawlessness and anarchy are still harder tyrants."
