Contrary to earlier misgivings by Dr. Kenneth A. Parker, superintendent of city schools, members of the City School Board, who met at the seven Charlottetown high and elementary schools, proceeded for their work as was originally anticipated.

City officials had been apprehensive as to how the new redistribution of school zones in the city would be accepted by the parents of the school children. They also expected that there would be several instances of confusion regarding the zone boundaries.

NO HITCH

"Apparently every parent prior to school opening made themselves thoroughly acquainted with the new set-up and were able to do their parts without a hitch," Dr. Parker said.

Announcing the number of pupils who enrolled today, Dr. Parker said that between the two high schools and the five elementary schools a total of 2,749 students turned up for the first day. He anticipates that this year's enrollment will be between 100 and 200 during the next two weeks, as several families have not yet returned to the province from summer vacations.

IS OVERCROWDED

A breakdown of the number enrolled shows that at Birchwood High School there are 700 pupils, and at Charlotte High School 640.

At the elementary schools, 762 were unable to be accommodated at the high school, and these pupils are being housed in the new school.

Dr. Parker said that when a Birchwood was built the board and other school officials did not envision such an expansion in the number of high school students and that adequate accommodation would run out in the short space of three years.

He said there are two main reasons why these conditions exist at Birchwood and Queen's Charlotte. The first is that there are many students staying to complete grade 11.

MANY RETURN

Secondly, there is a heavy enrolment of students returning who were previously failures in grades eight, nine and 10. Contrary to the idea held by many parents and former students that these pupils would not be welcomed back, Dr. Parker said that the school board has had all others connected with the operation of the school for very many years.

"One fact does point up," said Dr. Parker, "is that both fall and winter sessions are more and more becoming aware of the important part of education in playing in community and world affairs today."
