The Agricultural Committee.

The special committee, recently appointed in the Dominion House of Commons, to enquire into the effects of the Tariff on the agricultural interests of Canada, has received a great deal of valuable information.

I am interested in cotton, woolen, and iron manufactures. Woolen goods of Canadian manufacture are cheaper now than they were prior to 1878.

Bank of Prince Edward Island.

To the Editor of the Examiner.

DEAR SIR.—The difficulties under which the Bank of P. E. Island is at present laboring can be greatly mitigated if the Board of Directors (whose duty it is to do all in their power to bring matters to a successful issue) show a determination to re-open the doors of the Institution.

Liquidation virtually means litigation, which would reduce the amounts due depositors to a minimum. If a compromise, such as above suggested, is effected, it would be greatly advantageous, inasmuch as we would know the exact sum we would receive; but, if the terrible alternative, liquidation, is decided upon, the enormous sums which would be grabbed by the lawyers, when deducted, would leave a very small portion indeed for the creditors, and even this meagre balance would be harded the victims years afterward.

If prompt action be not taken by the Directors, and the foregoing matters seriously considered, our people will be justified in concluding that liquidation, and that only, is sought by them, and though resumption has been proven possible and in the best interest of the people of P. E. Island, they will not admit of it.
