A MEETING of the Jubilee Committee was held in the City Council Chamber on Saturday evening last at which a letter from the Secretary of the Park Roadway Committee, enclosing the resolution published in another column, was received and read.

WE understand that a lawn tennis match has been arranged between a team selected from the Fitzroy and Miamea Clubs of this city and a team from the Pictou Lawn Tennis Club. The Pictou team will arrive here on Monday evening next, and the match will be played at Victoria Park on Tuesday.

WE regret to note that a carriage road is being made anglewise across the south side of Queen Square opposite the Brown Block. Could not the Mayor or Chairman of street committee prevent this? A post with a placard affixed at each end of the new carriageway labelled "No Thoroughfare," would probably deter those who drive carriages from spoiling the appearance of that part of the Square. Or if this expedient should fail let a gate be placed across the way at each end.

AN INFORMATION was to-day laid before the Stipendiary Magistrate by His Lordship Bishop McIntyre against an undertaker of this city, charging him with having removed the body of a man recently buried in the Roman Catholic Cemetery. So far as we can learn, it appears that the deceased was buried in unconsecrated ground, and his friends desiring to remove the body, engaged the undertaker to do so, and this was done, but previously no permission was asked of the Bishop. A summons was issued by the Magistrate, and the case will be heard to-morrow morning.

A CORRESPONDENT of the Moncton Times writes as follows: "Now that the dread disease typhoid or fever is commencing its ravages in our midst, I think that it is the duty of every citizen to see that yards and back premises are clean, and free from any substance that would be likely to create disease. There are a certain class in every community who will not attend to this very necessary and important duty without being forced to do so. Nominally we have a board of health, but what use they are I cannot conceive. Is it the duty of their secretary to personally see that premises are kept clean so that the health of the citizens may not be endangered? If it is he evidently does not attend to it. Or should they appoint some party specially for that purpose? A visit to some of the back yards in the very heart of the town, will at once convince any one who will take that trouble, that somebody is not doing their duty, and the responsibility must be upon the board of health—and a very serious responsibility it is." Our board of health should consider if a similar state of affairs does not exist in Charlottetown.

An Absconding Cashier. MONTREAL, July 30.

A City Swamped. AUGUSTA, GA., July 31.
