FDR's Sons Keep Magic Of Roosevelt Name Alive

WASHINGTON (AP)—James Roosevelt, now a congressman from California, is trying for mayor of Los Angeles. That election is next Tuesday, April 13. Elliott Roosevelt, now a Florida business consultant is running for mayor of Miami Beach. That election is June 1. And Franklin D. Roosevelt Jr., now under secretary of commerce, is thinking of running for governor of New York next year. These sons of former president Franklin Delano Roosevelt are keeping very much alive the political magic of the Roosevelt name, 20 years after the death of their father. All three inherited much of his personal charm and magnetism. All are big, strapping physical specimens. Just as FDR was in his younger days. And all are liberal Democrats. But, being individuals, they don't agree on everything. For one thing, they are not of one mind about what effect being a Roosevelt has had on their political careers. Jimmy—everybody calls him that—says it has helped a lot and hurt a little. Franklin says it hasn't had any effect. Elliott says, "of course it's important, don't kid yourself."

Fulton To Support John Diefenbaker

VICTORIA (CP)—E. Davis Fulton has pledged he will "work with and support" Conservative Leader John Diefenbaker when he returns to federal politics after an absence of two years. Mr. Fulton, former justice and public works minister in the Diefenbaker federal governments, announced that he will give up his leadership of the B.C. Conservative party. He will seek re-election as Conservative Member of Parliament for Kamloops, a riding he represented for 18 years before he took over the provincial leadership in 1963. Dr. Charles Willoughby, Conservative MP for Kamloops, has announced his retirement. Mr. Fulton has been mentioned as a possible successor to Mr. Diefenbaker for some time. But he said at a press conference that his decision to return to the federal scene has nothing to do with the leadership. Asked if he would be interested in the leadership if Mr. Diefenbaker stepped down, he would only say "no comment."

EPA Plane Wrecked

ST. PIERRE, St. Pierre-Miquelon (CP)—An Eastern Provincial Airways DC-3 that ran off the end of the runway Saturday at the St. Pierre airport on these tiny French islands off the south coast of Newfoundland was wrecked. No one was injured. An EPA spokesman said Sunday the plane, on a charter flight from St. John's, Nfld., to St. Pierre, did not crash as earlier reported but continued off the end of the runway when it was unable to stop because of ice. The spokesman said the plane had its undercarriage torn away. One wing was extensively damaged and both engines were ripped from the wings.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

Opening lead—king of spades. Declarer starts the play of most hands with only a limited knowledge of how the opponents' cards are divided. But as the play progresses, he learns more and more about the makeup of the unseen hands, and in some cases can perform really marvelous deeds as a result of the conclusions he is able to draw. For example, take a hand like this one where South performed nobly. West led the king of spades and then shifted to a trump. Declarer took the heart in dummy and played a club to the jack. He hoped that East, despite his ace of one spade, might have one queen, in which case the jack would force the ace. But West took the queen and continued with the ace and another club, which South ruffed. Declarer then drew two rounds of trumps, followed by a low diamond to the ten, which won. Pursuing his search for additional information, South ruffed a club. When West followed suit, South had all the knowledge he needed to make the hand. He played a low diamond to the ace, catching the king, and thus made the contract. Had he led the queen instead, in order to repeat the previously successful finesse, he would have lost a diamond trick later and gone down on the hand. It is interesting to follow South's thinking in the matter, because it gave him proof positive that West had started with the doubleton king of diamonds. Declarer reasoned that if West had held: Spades AK10x Hearts x Diamonds Kxx Clubs AQ10x he would have opened the bidding with a club, not a spade. This would have been the proper opening bid with such a hand. Since West had opened with a spade, it followed that he had five spades, and hence that he could have only two diamonds. This conclusion turned out to be eminently correct. It simply goes to show the power of positive thinking.

made his mark in Florida politics. He won a surprisingly easy victory in 1964 in a 14-candidate race for the office of Democratic national committeeman from Florida. FIGHT 'NEWCOMER' This year, when Elliott announced for mayor, the present mayor, Melvin J. Richard, said he would stay and fight the bid of "this newcomer." The possibility that Elliott might be considered for governor of Florida in 1966, or for a seat in Congress, has been printed in Miami. Asked about it, he said: "I have absolutely no ambition to run for governor or the house. I moved here to live here, not to move out." Elliott, over the years, has come in for considerable criticism and he was asked whether he felt that some of it might have been intensified because he was a Roosevelt. MORE EXPOSED "I think that's quite true," he said. "You are much more exposed and any mishap that might occur is going to be publicized more than if you weren't related."

What do you look forward to politically, beyond the mayor's job. If you should win that. He has been talked of for the Senate, or governor. "Oh, now," he protested with a wide grin. "I'm about 57 years old—and if I can do a good job as mayor, that's my limit." Roosevelt has been campaigning harder than his No. 1 opponent, Samuel W. Yorty, who is now the mayor. Yorty has been favored to win re-election, but his aides have been saying they wished he would campaign as hard as Roosevelt. Roosevelt didn't resign from Congress to run for mayor, and he'd keep his seat if he loses. Elliott, who had been active in a variety of businesses in New York, Texas, Arizona, Iowa and California, quickly
