Huge Mining Project In Manitoba To Be Started

WINNIPEG (CP)—Construction of a \$175,000,000 mining development in Northern Manitoba wilderness which will open up "one of the greatest remaining frontiers in North America" will start immediately. It was announced Wednesday.

In a joint statement by International Nickel Company of Canada Ltd. and the Manitoba government, the company said it will start moving material and equipment to the Mystery-Moak Lakes area, 40 miles north of Winnipeg, this winter to take advantage of the freeze-up for transportation. Tractor train hauling is the only practical way of getting to the site in winter.

The development, to extend over the next three or four years will make Northern Manitoba the world's second largest nickel-producing area behind Northern Ontario's Sudbury area which now produces 65 per cent of world supplies. It will include two mines The Thomson and The Moak, in the mineral rich Precambrian shield.

Decision to go ahead with the development came after 10 years of exploration at a cost to the company of \$10,000,000. However, Inco President Henry S. Wingate of New York said ore findings fully justify the cost of the project which is to include:

1. A company townsite of about 8,000 to be named Thomson in honor of Dr. John F. Thompson, chairman of the board of Inco.

2. A \$32,000,000 to \$38,000,000 government power plant at Grand Rapids, 50 miles northeast of the site, to be partially financed by the company with a four-year \$20,000,000 loan.

3. A 30-mile Canadian National Railway spur line from the CNR Hudson Bay Railway, running from the Pas to Churchill, at a cost of \$5,000,000 and a company operated 20-mile line linking the two mines.

4. Homes and buildings, including schools and hospitals, at the townsite which are expected to cost \$20,000,000.

5. Construction of a concentrator, smelter, townsite installations, transportation facilities and a production from the new project is expected in 1960 and at a peak will reach an estimated 65,000,000 pounds of ore annually. Together with expansion planned at Sudbury, it will lift Inco's nickel production capacity by about 130,000,000 pounds to 385,000,000.

HIGH-GRADE NICKEL
Mr. Wingate said the proposed smelter will be able to produce ore with a nickel content of 74 per cent, a marketable grade comparable to Sudbury's.

Meanwhile, Inco has been checking into the Hudson Bay summer port of Churchill, at the mouth of the Hudson Bay Railway northeast of the mining site. Nickel may be shipped out of the port to Inco refineries in Britain and early steel requirements for construction may be brought in there.

International Nickel's discoveries in Manitoba extend over an area 75 to 80 miles long and five miles wide. For the moment the company does not intend to develop Mystery Lake deposits which 10 years ago sparked Inco exploration.

Mr. Wingate said the new production will substantially increase the free world's supply of nickel for industry and defence. It will also play an important part "in opening up what may prove to be one of the greatest remaining frontiers in North America."

Budapest Opera May Be Canadian

OTTAWA (CP)—The Immigration department is considering "a hint" that the Budapest Opera Company, now in an Austrian refugee camp, would like to move in a body to Canada.

An immigration spokesman said the department is informally seeking details from its officials in Vienna to determine how many persons would be involved.

He said Canada is willing to take in all Hungarian refugees but it was not for the department to set up the group in some Canadian city as an opera company.

Toronto Stocks
TORONTO (CP)—The stock market recorded its first decline in seven sessions Monday. Base metals were the leaders in the setback, mainly due to profit-taking resulting from last week's strong recovery. The downward trend was minimized, however, and trading slowed on the decline.

The loss ended a six-session recovery which began near the end of trading Nov. 29 after the market had undergone a month-long general decline.

Observers said the decline action could be profit-taking alone, a natural reaction following any advance.

Gains were slightly outnumbered by losses across the board with western oils having the widest margin. Junior mines were the hardest hit by profit-taking since they marked up strong gains last week.

Falconbridge gained 1/2 among senior base metals but Hudson Bay lost 1/2 points. Other changes were minor fractions, mostly on the down grade. Coppers were strong with Chibougamau Mining and Copperand ahead 25 cents and other issues added gains ranging to 10 cents.

Western oils had a wider range among losses. Dome Exploration (Western) and Canada Oil Lands lost 25 cents. Several other stocks were off between 10 and 20 cents. Security added 15 cents but other gains were generally less than 10 cents.
