Pete Kelly Tied For Lead In Golf Tourney

SAINT JOHN, N. B., July 17 (CP) — P. C. (Pete) Kelly, Fredrickson, and W. D. (Bill) Davidson, of the host club, tied with 75's today for a one-stroke lead in the opening round of the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island Amateur Golf championship at the Riverside Golf and Country Club.

Kelly, a three-time winner of the title and former National Hockey League star with Detroit Red Wings, came down the home nine with a hot one-over-par 36 to deadlock Davidson for leadership of the fastest medal field in the history of Maritime golf.

Trailing one stroke behind were another three-time champion, Walter Reed, Jr., of the Aroostook Valley Country Club, and T. K. Stewart, of the St. Croix Golf Club.

Tied for third position, all with 77s, were Thane Cody of Riverside, Eugene Mealey of the Westfield Country Club and R. F. Morrison of Moncton.

Hottest round of the day was fired by Don Sinclair, of Riverside, the defending professional and open champion, who equalled the course par 70 despite a one-over 36 on the back nine.

In the amateur race 13 players broke 90 and grabbed top spots in the fight for the leading 18 positions which will mean qualification for the championship 36 holes on Thursday.

At Monday night's game the umpires were dressed nattily in their new official uniforms, complete with white sweat shirts with crests, and umpires' caps. Having the ump's in official regalia adds something to the game.

What about that old proverb: "Fine feathers make fine birds"? Don't tell that to the Marines. Tell it to the Airforce!

Some of the old-timers will tell you that things happen in sequences of three. If that is so, we can expect another juggling act at first base any day now. Twice in a week a first baseman has juggled a throw and then held it securely after the runner had crossed the base. Rather a coincidence because that particular fumble happens rarely enough. Both times the runner was declared out. Let us hope the next time it happens the runner will be given justice and allowed to remain on the sack.

Umpires, we think, should have some sort of rule regarding how much they will take from a player before throwing him out of the game. If they could keep in mind: "This far shall he go, and no further" and stick to that, come hades or a high tide, players would begin to know how far they could go and not trespass on the arbiters' tolerance any further. For example, an umpire threw a player out of the game here Monday night for making a threatening gesture with his bat. The umpire was quite within his rights. He doesn't have to tolerate such action.

The trouble was the same umpire was actually pushed around in the contest before that and let the offending player stay in the game. This uneven-handed justice is what causes trouble.

We sympathize with the umpires in this business and appreciate the fact they do not mean to show any favoritism. Sometimes an incident occurs when the official is in a tranquil mood. Everything is up to that time has been going fine. So the offending player escapes. Then again, just when the umpire is raging inwardly and ready to explode because of being ridden by the fans, perhaps, or because of some other irritating happenings connected with the game, a player waves sarcastic to him. "Puff! Out he goes. It's quite understandable, but umpires should strive to give all players the same treatment nevertheless.

Charles & Walcott Meet Tonight In Title Fight

PITTSBURGH, July 17 (AP)—The Ezzard Charles-Joe Walcott series moves into Forbes Field tomorrow night for a third—and probably last—stand with Champion Ezzard a lopsided favorite to ruin 37-year-old Jersey Joe's fifth heavyweight title bid. Odds range from 3 to 1 to 5 to 1. The pick here is Charles by a knockout in 10 rounds.

Interest is red hot in Pittsburgh's first official heavyweight championship show. The Rooney-McGinley Company, promoting with co-sponsorship by the Dapper Dan and Variety Club, reports \$122,000 already in the till. They estimate 20,000 persons and about \$200,000 which would be the largest fight gate of the year. That does not include the \$100,000 paid by nine television set manufacturers for TV and radio rights.

Stars Wallop Rovers 8-2 McCallum Turns Pitcher And Hurls Two - Hitter

East End Stars came up with some tight ball behind the two-hit pitching of Arnold McCallum to wallop the league leading North-east Rovers 8-2 in a regular City Baseball League fixture at Memorial Field last evening.

The game was called for darkness after seven innings.

It was the Stars' third victory and Rovers second loss in seven starts, the Stars win putting them into a three-way deadlock for second place with West End Anchors and Northwest Falcons two games below the front running Rovers.

Hard pressed for pitchers with Ev Beagan and Junior McLeod absent from the City and Lefty McAlear unable to be on deck due to business reasons, McCallum swapped his regular position behind the plate to go out on the mound and made a creditable showing with a winning performance of two hits, two runs, and striking out three. Showing a little difficulty on control in the early stages of the game, he walked five but steadied down well in the latter half with good hurling.

One of Rovers regular and popular moundsmen, Benny Carson, was the loser. He was tagged for seven hits including a triple by Red Howatt in the fifth that drove in two runs and a double by McCallum in the seventh, but struck out 10 batters and allowed three walks. Charlie Ready, first sacker for Stars, collected the other double of the game off Carson in the fourth.

Stars collected their runs with a big three rally in the first on two hits, repeated the performance in the fifth on one hit and pushed two more across in the seventh on one bingle.

Rovers chalked up one run in

the third on a single and scored their other tally in the fifth or two errors and a wild pitch. Stars had four earned runs and Rovers none.

One of the neatest fielding efforts of the game was by left fielder Elmer Ward of Rovers. Ward had to come in fast from a deep position, to snare a hard hit ball inches off the grass.

American Craft Wins Yacht Race

HALIFAX, July 17 (CP)—Lack of wind tonight stalled completion of the Biennial Marblehead, Mass., to Halifax yacht race but unofficial results gave the top spot to an American craft.

The Carina, skippered by Richard Nye, was first to cross the finish line of the 360-mile classic here and, with her handicap, seemed almost certain to cop top honors.

The official results, however, are not released until all yachts have crossed the finish line.

At mid-afternoon today, only half the 20-competing craft had finished the voyage, started from Marblehead Sunday and bogged down most of the way by light winds and fog off the Nova Scotia coast.
