

Damp, Cold Weather Reduces Enthusiasm

A damp chill seems to have settled over this province during the first few days of July. Night-time temperatures, dipping into the low 40's, and daytime readings hovering around the 50s and 60s, combined with three days of rain have made the first part of this month an unattractive one for holiday-makers. The low temperature readings have not yet set a record for this province, however, the coolest July day on record was in 1919 when a temperature of 39 degrees was recorded. The hottest day, July 30, 1949, had a high of 92 degrees.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States Bureau of prisons will begin closing out Alcatraz next year by transferring prisoners to other penal institutions.

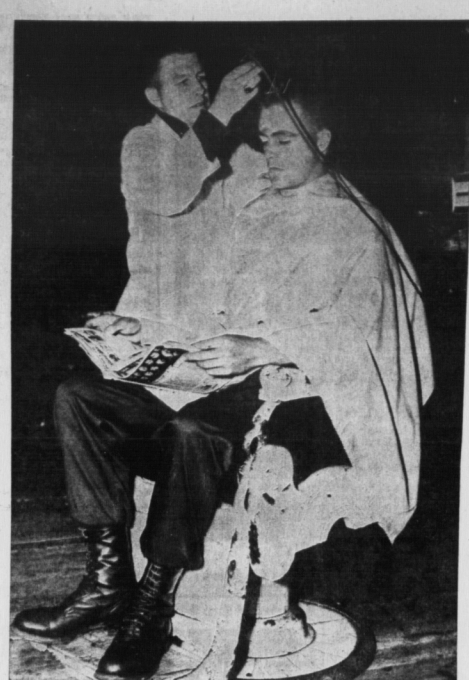

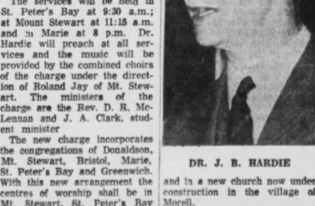

Outlook Said Promising For Strawberry Crop

Officials of local berry producing plants, and the deputy minister of agriculture, Stewart Wright, reported yesterday that present indications for the strawberry crop appear to be good in practically every berry growing area in the province.

Some of the spokesmen stated that their own observations of the plant growth led them to believe that this year's crop will be as good, or probably better, than that of last year, which was considered to be a very good year.

In some areas of the province, growers experienced patches of winter frost kill, but the extent of this type of kill was classified as minor. Most plants came through the winter with practically no frost damage and matured into good healthy plants.

Earlier in the season, growers did experience some doubt as to the weight of the coming crop, due to the lack of moisture. But the rains of recent weeks have completely dispelled the doubt.

Indications are that the strawberry plants now are heavy with blossom and formed berries, and warm weather is needed to bring them to maturity.

Should this warm weather move in in the next day or two, processors are confident that the heavy picking will get underway early next week, enabling the processing plants to swing into full production about midweek.
