



Former Island Resident Linked To Success Story

The name of a son of Prince Edward Island, George Darrach, is linked closely with what has to be one of the top success stories in Canadian livestock history. A native of Milou, his father, Angus Darrach still lives there—George is farm manager for Oak Ridge Farms, near Toronto which recently sold a cow for a world record price.

Records fell left and right, the Holstein office says "as one of Canada's most famous Holstein herds went under the auctioneer's gavel at Senator Harry Hays' sales arena at Oakville, Ontario."

She was purchased by Russel Rowntree, Woodbridge and Robert Lowe, Maple, Ontario. The previous world record price for a dairy cow was the \$38,000 paid for Romandale Shamrock Elsie, also a Holstein owned by Romandale Farms, Unionville, Ontario.

April Landings Exceed Average

Total fish landings in the Maritime Provinces during April, 1966 amounted to 61.5 million pounds valued at 4.8 million dollars. Included in these totals were 45.2 million pounds of groundfish valued at 2.6 million dollars, 12 million pounds of pelagic fish valued at 2.7 million dollars, and 3.7 million pounds of shellfish valued at 1.9 million dollars.

Landings for April exceeded the average catch during the years 1963-1965 by 24.3 million pounds and one million dollars. Groundfish landings during the month exceeded the average April catch during the past three years by 15.6 million pounds and one million dollars while pelagic landings were 8.5 million pounds and 166 thousand dollars above average. The quantity of shellfish landed during the month was the same as the 1963-1965 average, however, the landed value of the shellfish catch was below the average.

The storm will continue its rapid eastward motion to cross Newfoundland this morning. Skies will clear in the wake of the storm. Afternoon temperatures will reach the 50s in all but northern New Brunswick, where readings in the 40s are expected. Strong winds will blow for most of the day.

The disturbance earlier forecast to bring rain to all three provinces Sunday appears now to be taking a more southerly course. As a result, rain is now expected in only Nova Scotia.
