Teacher Training Students Present Fine Concert

A large crowd at the Prince of Wales auditorium last evening witnessed the concert as presented by the Teacher Training students, under the direction of Miss Helen Yeo.

Opening the evening with a short address of welcome, Mr. F. MacKenna, Principal of P. W. C. gave credit to departments outside of teacher training who had donated so generously of their time and talents.

High spot of the entertainment was the presentation of the fantasy "The Blue Willow Plate", played in the true Chinese fashion, with narrator, property and stage hand rearranging the stage in full view of the audience as the play proceeded, it was a fresh and entirely different style of production.

The play itself tells the story behind the old willow pattern so often seen on various pieces of china, and although the various actors and actresses do not get a real opportunity to give serious characterizations, it usually makes for good entertainment. In last night's presentation it was the setting and lighting that aroused most comment and these were the work of Miss Ella Lowe and Mr. Earl Nicholson.

The costumes were authentic Chinese robes, and were particularly attractive.

In the first of the two plays presented, "The Trusting Place", top honors must go to Mr. Norman Ford for his comedy role as Lancelot Briggs.

The audience was kept laughing through some parts of the play which usually has a tendency to drag, by the almost burlesque characterization Mr. Ford gave to his role of the lovelick teenager.

Fishermen's Load Bd. Report

The conclusion that this Province must advance its fisheries by giving "immediate study to methods of inshore and offshore fishing" from the standpoints of modernizing catching methods, expanding and modernizing shore facilities is noted in the report of the Fishermen's Loan Board tabled in the Legislature yesterday by Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Resources.

"It was felt that these developments must go hand in hand," the report states. "With this in mind, an exhaustive study of types of boats was undertaken. Various types were considered and it was decided to concentrate on the introduction of one type as an initial effort. This was a 59 ft. dragger of the Caraque type. A contract is being let for one of these boats at the present time."

Since its appointment on April 22, 1949 until Jan. 31 last, the new Board has dealt with loans totalling \$47,754, of which \$12,910 has been repaid. In addition to the collections of loans made by the present Board, loans under the old Board amounting to \$18,966 have been collected.

The statement shows that revenue exceeded expenditure by \$15,413 under the new Board's operations.

The title of the Fishermen's Loan Act, now in effect, will be changed to "Re-establishment Assistance Act" under amendments to the Statute Law now being given second reading in the Legislature.

Mrs. Julian Herring then led the group in a demonstration of the average Institute meeting with the emphasis on procedure. After a short talk on resolutions at district conventions, by Mrs. W. F. A. Stewart, tea was served by the supervisors, Miss Robin and Miss Boswell.

Following this the entire group attended the afternoon sitting of the Legislature.

Evening Session. Mrs. Harold Laird presided at the evening session of the course which opened with a discussion on vocational training led by Mrs. Malcolm MacLeod. As a result of this discussion it was moved that a study of vocational training be made on Prince Edward Island in all levels of institute work.

A very interesting talk was given by Mr. George Di Carlo who spoke on design and its relation to handicrafts. One of the points he stressed was the need of suitable designs in hooked rugs.

A solo was given by Miss Nancy MacNevin which was very much enjoyed, after which Miss Marjorie Hill gave a demonstration and talk on Nutrition.

Diocesan Church Society Annual Meeting Held

An Executive meeting in connection with the 105th annual meeting of the Diocesan Church Society was held yesterday afternoon in St. Peter's Parish Hall with the Venerable Archbishop Harrison, B.D. in the chair.

All the clergy of the Diocese were present as well as a large number of delegates from the various parishes.

It was pointed out that the Diocese had again oversubscribed its Missionary appropriation. It was recommended that an assessment be made on all the parishes for the repairs, upkeep and equipment of the Church Center at Crapaud, and a vote of appreciation was passed regarding the splendid work done by the Women's Auxiliary in connection with the camps for girls held at the Church Center during the past few years, and assurance of assistance from the Society for the coming year was held during the coming summer. Officers and committees were nominated for election at the annual meeting which will be held in St. Peter's Cathedral Hall this afternoon at 3 o'clock, when general business will be transacted and an address given by His Grace Archbishop Kingston, Primate of all Canada.

The annual meeting of the D.C.S. and W.A. service was held last evening in St. Peter's Cathedral, which was filled. The Primate was the preacher and chose as his text the words "The Lord hath been mindful of us and shall bless us," which is a part of the 12th verse of the 115th Psalm. During a splendid discourse His Grace spoke of the persecutions of the Church today by Principalities, Powers and Rulers. Of this need of defending the Faith, of the hope for re-union of the whole Christian Church and the need of developing holiness through worship. Previous to the sermon the Archbishop conveyed the greetings of Bishop Waterman and the whole Church in Canada to the two Societies now holding their annual meetings, and thanked the Church people of the Island for their faithfulness in backing up the undertakings of the Church. The following clergy took part in the service, Rev. A. Percy of Milton, Rev. S. J. Armstrong of Crapaud, Rev. Leslie Dignan of Port Hill, Rev. J. R. McMahon of Alberton, Venerable Archbishop Harrison, Rev. J. T. Bobb and Rev. S. J. Davies attended the Primate. During the service the Miserere was sung as a devotion. The hymns sung were 119, 624 and 289.

The Rev. Canon Malone invited all present to go over to the Rectory after service to meet the Primate.

A celebration of the Holy Communion will take place in St. Paul's Church this morning for the D.C.S. and W.A. The Primate will be the celebrant. At 12.30 luncheon will be served in St. Peter's Parish Hall. Meetings of the various departments of the D.C.S. will be held this morning in St. Paul's Parish Hall.
