Opening lead—king of hearts two spades and the defense. Let's say you're declarer at two spades and the defense starts out with three rounds of hearts. You ruff the third one, noting that all you can now afford to lose are three trump tricks.

If you make the mistake of leading the jack of spades, you eventually go down one, losing first to the king and later to the A-Q-8.

But if you lead a low spade instead of the jack, you make the contract, losing three trump tricks instead of four.

## Canadian Publisher Notes Trend To Republican Gov't

MONTREAL (CP) — In another bid to diversify its operations and get out of over-dependence on Canadian defence contracts, Canadair Ltd. is going into the bus production field.

The company recently received its first contract from the Montreal Transportation Commission for a total of 50 buses at a cost of \$1,750,000, with delivery by next Jan. 22.

The company says much of the equipment used in assembling military vehicles is adaptable to bus production and total expenditure to switch to the new field was estimated at only \$500,000.

"We are in the business to stay," said T. A. Harvie, a Canadian vice-president. "As of now, we will be bidding on all urban transit bus requirements across Canada."

A company spokesman said the market potential in Canada is about 600 coaches a year, 200 to new customers and 400 as replacements. About 2,000 of the buses now in use in Canada were rapidly approaching the replacement stage.

The coaches will have about 40 per cent Canadian content, with such items as engines, axles and transmissions to be imported from the U.S. The company figures its break-even point on bus production will be about 200 units a year.

## First Quarter Shows Deficit, Ottawa Reports

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada had a current account deficit of \$408,000,000 in the first quarter of 1965 in its balance of payments with foreign countries, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics has reported.

This compared with a deficit of \$343,000,000 in the first quarter of 1964 and a deficit of \$453,000,000 for the whole of 1964.

The bureau said the growth of the quarterly deficit over year-earlier figures was wholly the result of a worsening in the trade balance. The \$408,000,000 deficit was the largest in the 1960s for the January-March period.

There were record levels of international trade for the winter period as a result of a rising economic activity both in Canada and in the United States. But U.S. moves to reduce the American imbalance of payments affected capital flows into Canada.

Whereas Canada had a \$376,000,000 deficit on non-merchandise transactions in the first quarter of 1964, it had a \$33,000,000 merchandise trade surplus and this cut the deficit on current account to \$343,000,000.

This year, Canada had a deficit on non-merchandise transactions of \$57,000,000, bringing the deficit in the current account balance to \$408,000,000.

## Shipments Down Of Wool Cloth

MONTREAL (CP)—Volume of wool cloth shipped by Canadian textile mills during April was less than in the corresponding month of 1964, the Canadian Textiles Institute said here.

Total shipments in April were 2,911,000 square yards against 2,919,000 a year earlier.

Square yards in the first four months of 1965 totalled 10,112,000 compared with 11,198,000 for the same period in 1964.

Peter Gooch, president of Canadian Vickers Industries Ltd., of Montreal, whose company is working on a \$45,000,000 order for 360 cars and five tractor units for Montreal's new subway system, said his company is looking into bus production "quite seriously" and predicted a decision on the matter would be made in a month or so.

However, Vickers is already diversified and serves many industrial fields including brewery equipment and hydraulic gates for hydro-electric plants, he said.

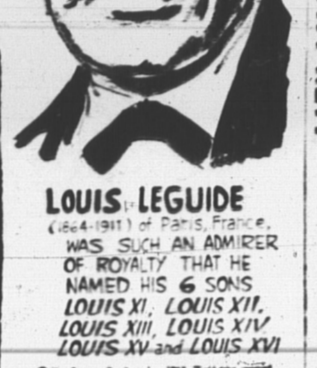
"Bus production would mean the addition of a good deal of plant equipment and this would involve a capital expenditure before we can go into the field," said Mr. Gooch.

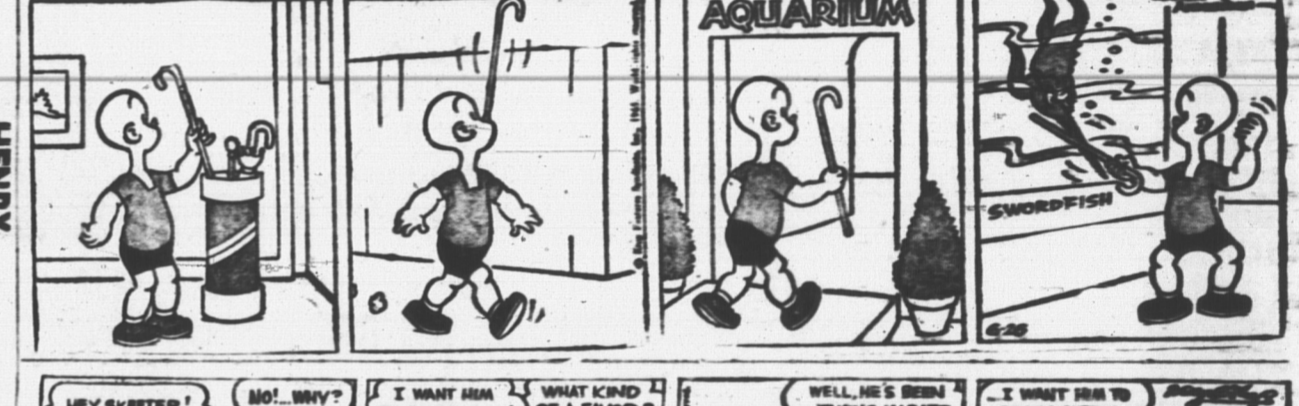
