Screams Awaken Neighbors

S'ide Father Collapses From Smoke When Mattress Burns

Summerside firemen were called out yesterday morning shortly after five o'clock when a mattress caught fire in an apartment located at the corner of Notre Dame and Summer Streets in which Mr. and Mrs. Jack Cameron and their two children reside. When firemen arrived the mattress had been removed to the outdoors by upstairs neighbors who rushed down to help after being aroused by screams of the Cameron children who apparently were awakened by the smoke.

However, Mr. Cameron was found on the kitchen floor in a

semi-conscious condition as a result of being overcome by the smoke. He had managed to get from the bedroom to the kitchen before collapsing from the effects of the heavy smoke. Mrs. Cameron had entered the Prince County Hospital the day previous to undergo treatment. Mr. Cameron was taken to hospital for a checkup but was released short time later. He is an employee of R. T. Holman, Ltd.

The mattress and some bed clothes were destroyed and some damage to the apartment resulted from the smoke and water.

SNOW IN WEST PRINCE

A heavy fall of snow Tuesday morning quickly blocked the Western Road near Elmsdale to motor traffic. All vehicles were unable to proceed until the passage of a snow plow from Tignish about noon. Despite three weeks of mild weather, cuttings are high in many sections of West Prince and there are few places for vehicles to meet on the road between Alberton and Montrose. Snow was heavier in O'Leary Tuesday and motor traffic was proceeding with difficulty Tuesday afternoon.

for residents for their share of street and sidewalk improvements. There were also assessments made during the year totalling \$13,654.12 against property owners for a portion of street and sidewalk improvements completed in 1954.

The extra-ordinary receipts referred to above enabled the City to write off during the year all the municipal expenditures, instead of charging them over a period of years, as first anticipated.

Debentures totalling \$94,750.00 matured during the year and were retired. One of these issues was the first refunding issue made in 1935 in the amount of \$2,250.00. The other issues totalling \$92,500.00 are to be replaced to the extent of 50 per cent with Refunding Debentures of \$43,250.00. These refunding Debentures were not issued in 1955 and should be issued in 1956. In the meantime, the Capital Funds show a liability to Sinking Funds for the amount of \$2,250.00.

The net debt of the City, consisting of Debentures Payable and Bank Overdrafts, less Cash and Bank Balances and Sinking Funds is \$3,766,848.21, an increase in 1955 of \$156,862.24. Details are on page 13.
