NEWS BY THE ENGLISH MAIL. THE WAR WITH RUSSIA.

SUBSCRIBER OF THE RUSSIANS AT SELAPOL. The "Theber," which left Constantinople on the 29th Sept, has arrived with news that the steamer "African" reached Constantinople on the 10th inst.

The Russians, only 35,000 strong, expected reinforcements of 10,000 men. It was thought, that the Allies would be fought on the 20th, before the arrival of the Russian reinforcements. The weather was magnificent.

A single accident had delayed the landing of the troops and material. The population were well disposed towards the allies, and offered them the most cordial assistance.

At Eupatoria 400 Russians surrendered on the first summons. At Buriuk several Russian spears were taken, and the Crimea was in the hands of the Allies.

ADVANCE OF PRINCE MENSHIKOFF TO MEET THE ALLIES. Prince Menshikoff has advanced with his troops to Buriuk, on the river Alma. He has taken his position, and is waiting for the allies, as well as for reinforcements.

Buriuk is a village on the right bank of the Alma, about 10 miles from the mouth of the river. It is a strong position, and is occupied by one of the Russian divisions in the field.

The Allies in their progress, have been obliged to march through a long and hot road, and have suffered from the want of water. They are now at Selapopol, and are waiting for the Russian reinforcements.
