A NUMBER of large porpoises entered Summerside harbor yesterday, and after a few hours hilarity left for the Straits.

THE population of the city of Montreal is, according to the official census return, 143,000; an increase of 36,000 during the past ten years.

THE first call on Shareholders of the Menon Driving Park Association has been collected, and the site for the Park will be selected in a few days.

THE Summerside Journal is issuing a supplement containing the speeches of Messrs Blake and Anglin, delivered at Summerside on Friday.

WEDNESDAY next has been fixed upon as the civic holiday in Winnipeg for the festivities in honor of the visit of His Excellency the Governor General.

JOHN ROBINS, Esq. of the Finance Department, who has been on a short visit to his family and friends in this city, left for Ottawa this morning.

A FEMALE REVIVALIST named Foster has been "exhorting the multitude" on King Square, St. John, N. B. She will shortly appear in Charlottetown.

THE farmers are taking advantage of the fine haying weather and are energetically gathering the abundant crop with which this Province has been favored.

J. E. BOYD, Esq., Engineer of Public Works for the Maritime Provinces, arrived from Ottawa on Saturday evening, and left for St. John, N. B., this morning.

AT New York, Gale the pedestrian, up to 1 o'clock on the afternoon of the 27th ult., had completed 4,346 quarter miles of his 6,000 quarter miles walk. The plucky walker is still in good condition.

MR. BLAKE has succeeded in creating a reaction in New Brunswick. At the last general election the province went Grit; at the next—the reaction having set in—it will go Tory.—Toronto Mail

THE steamer "Parisian" arrived at Rimouski on Friday in time for passengers for St. John, Halifax and Charlottetown to take the down train for their respective destinations. Passengers from England via Rimouski arrived in this city on Saturday night, instead of Monday night, as is usual.

THE steamer Prince Edward, Capt. Fraser, arrived from Montreal on Saturday with a part cargo, consisting of 27,605 bushels of wheat, 1,075 sheep. She will take about 12,000 boxes of lobsters and 333 sheep at this port and proceed on passage to Great Britain tomorrow morning.

THE Convention of the Catholic Total Abstinence Union will be held tomorrow in St. Patrick's Hall. The delegates will meet at 9 a. m., and proceed to St. Dunstan's Cathedral, where High Mass will be celebrated. A sermon will be preached by Dr. O'Brien and Bishop McIntyre will impart the Pagan benediction. In the evening, at 8 o'clock, a banquet will be given in St. Patrick's Hall in honor of the delegates.

THE average reader of the "points" made by Mr. Blake in his eastern speeches will find himself puzzled between the statements that our manufacturers enjoy "excessive protection" (which means prohibition), and the other statement that the tariff is a failure because our importations are increasing. If our manufacturers had "excessive prohibition" the imports would fall off. If the imports increase, then the manufacturers cannot have excessive protection.—Toronto Mail.

MR. ANGLIN, of St. John, N. B., has been invited to accompany Mr. Blake on his mission to Prince Edward Island. He did not accomplish wonders on the platform last winter in Halifax. He did not succeed in securing Mr. Caruichael's election in this County last month. And, the fact will be made plain that he will do more to damage his own party and materially assist in securing an immense majority in Prince Edward Island for the L. C. Party in 1883.—Plain Dealer.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS. EUROPE AND THE EAST. St. Petersburg, July 29. Thirty houses belonging to Jews at Bospol and Birizan in the Government of Poltava, have been destroyed. The troops fired upon the rioters, four of whom were killed and two wounded. LONDON, July 29. In the House of Commons this afternoon Sir Wm. Harcourt, Home Secretary, said precaution would be taken against the Bradlanch meeting to protest against the exclusion of that agitator from the House of Commons, or interrupting with traffic or causing a disturbance in the Palace yard. The meeting is to be held in Trafalgar square on Tuesday evening. In House to-night the land bill was read a third time, and passed by a vote 221 to 14, the minority being exclusively Conservatives. In the House of Lords to-night the bill was read a first time. The second reading is fixed for Monday next.

LONDON, July 29. The Daily News says there can be little doubt that Candahar is Ayob Khan's immediate destination, and that he is master of the surrounding country. The Ameer's defeat cannot effect the British policy, as the Ameer was clearly informed that on the departure of the British from Candahar he must rely on his own resources. The Times' Quetta report says: "On the 20th inst., Ayob breaks camp near Girishk and marched south, turning the left flank of the Ameer's army on the 21st. The latter followed, but did not come up with Ayob until he reached Karez Atta, thirty-two miles from Candahar, where the action which resulted in the Ameer's defeat was fought. A regiment of regulars and the Candahar horse deserted after the fight."

PARIS, July 29. A decree has been promulgated ordering elections for the members of the Chamber of Deputies on the 21st August. The second ballots on Sunday, in spite of the Governments only desiring a partial sale, has passed a bill for the sale of the whole of the Crown diamonds, the proceeds to be devoted to the museum fund. M. Gambetta, President of the Chamber of Deputies, to-day read the decree closing the session of the chamber.

LONDON, July 29. A despatch from Copenhagen to the Standard says: In spite of the Radical triumphs in the election the ministers have determined, so long as they are backed by a majority of the upper house, to continue their struggle for the constitution of 1856, which gives both houses equal power. The Radicals are endeavoring to make the lower house supreme by imposing ministers of its own.

LONDON, July 29. The Hamburg-American Steamship Co. will henceforth send two steamers from Hamburg to New York weekly, instead of one a week, as heretofore.

BANK NOTES.—An Ottawa despatch of the 30th ult. says:—Since the 1st of July, banks are not allowed to issue bills of a less denomination than \$5. It is thought that the circulation of \$4 will be abolished entirely.

By-Law to Encourage New Industries in the City of Charlottetown. BE it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows: 1. All applications for exemption of new industries from taxation shall be made by petition to the Mayor and Council, such petition to be signed by the person, company or corporation presenting the same, and to contain full particulars of the new industry sought to be exempted, the amount of capital proposed to be invested therein, and the amount to be paid yearly for wages, and the tax or taxes from which exemption is sought. 2. Every such petition shall be accompanied by proper proofs that the advertisement required by law have been duly inserted, and no application shall be considered by the Council until after the expiration of fourteen days from the date of the last publication of such advertisements. 3. The Council on such application may exempt such new industries from taxation or from any particular species of taxation. 4. In case such application is contested, the Council may adjourn the hearing thereof from time to time, should they think fit but more than one application by any new industry shall be made within the fiscal year. 5. No exemption will be granted to any new industry which does not propose to expend yearly at least the sum of five thousand dollars in wages. 6. Any false statement or suppression of facts contained in any petition so to be presented as aforesaid shall absolutely annul any exemption and the tax shall be collected as if the same had never been made.
