SUPREME COURT.—The court met yesterday forenoon, pursuant to adjournment, the three judges being present. In the case of Mary McLeod vs. Kenneth McKenzie and Donald McLeod, an action of trespass and assault, tried Trinity term, 1890, when a verdict was entered for the plaintiff, the Chief Justice gave judgment discharging the rule nisi for a new trial. Mr. Justice Henley concurring. A. A. McLean for plaintiff, Davies for defendant. Court adjourned sine die.
