## N. Y. Stocks Have Fourth Straight Weekly Decline

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market chalked up its fourth straight weekly loss last week and ended November at a lower level than October.

The month began with a surging pre-election rise based on confidence President Eisenhower would be re-elected. The market settled back after the election and rises were few.

Friday's rally, the best since Nov. 1, went far toward cutting the week's losses.

As it was, the Associated Press average of 60 stocks was down 80 cents to \$175.20.

Prices in the final session were spurred by the 4-for-1 stock split announced by Bethlehem Steel after the close Thursday. Another influence was the announcement from Washington ordering into effect the emergency program to supply Western Europe with up to 1,100,000 barrels of oil daily because of the Suez Canal blockage.

## TIGHT MONEY

Stock exchange trading most of the week was dominated to a great extent by tight money and the high-interest rate situation.

Most Canadian issues registered losses. Aluminum Ltd. closed lower at 112 1/2, Canadian Pacific bond at 97 1/2, Hudson Bay Mining lost four to close at 81 and International Nickel was unchanged at 120 9/16.

On the American exchange Eureka gained 3-16, closing at 13-16. Brazilian Traction closed at 7 1/2, off 1/4. Shawington closed at 81, two points lower and Canadian Marconi was 3/4, unchanged from the previous week.

## Expect High Interest Rates, Tight Money Deal To Continue

OTTAWA (CP)—Federal authorities estimate the Canadian demand for money, powered by the heaviest investment planning in history, likely will remain strong for months to come.

That, they say, undoubtedly will mean continuing high interest rates in a tight money market. Borrowings are expected to be heavy not only in Canada but also in the United States where interest rates currently are lower than in this country.

The trade department will not complete its initial 1957 survey of capital investment planning until sometime in January or early February. But the current indications are that investment in 1957 for hospitals and other structures and machinery is likely at least to match or exceed the record 1956 outlays of some \$750,000,000.

## FUND RAISING

Canadian industrialists and various government bodies such as cities and provinces are pressing ahead with plans to raise increasing amounts of funds to meet construction needs.

Many have turned to the United States. Authorities say these borrowers are in a sense betting on the exchange value of the Canadian dollar.

The Canadian dollar has been hovering at an unusually high premium exchange rate. Last Thursday, it was at a 23-year premium high of 4 17/32 cents over United States funds.

Canadians, borrowing in the U.S., thus find themselves with smaller proceeds when they exchange the American funds into Canadian dollars.

However, when they come to repay the loan, they may find the premium rate changed. The Canadian dollar may return to par with the American. In that case, it would take a larger amount of Canadian dollars to buy American than if the Canadian dollar had remained at a high premium.

## OFFSETTING FACTOR

But there is an offsetting factor. Generally, American interest rates are lower than those in Canada and this could lead to some savings in borrowing costs.

As a reflection of the trend, the U.S. federal reserve lending rate has remained steady at three per cent since the beginning of the year. In contrast, the Bank of Canada rate on loans to chartered banks and other institutions has climbed, reaching a record 3.77 per cent last Thursday.
