At the close of the meeting the Park Cricket Club will be re-organized for the season. PATRIOTIC CLERGYMEN.—We learn that the Rev. Mr. Fotheringham, Presbyterian; Rev. G. G. Roberts, Episcopal; Rev. D. D. Moore, Methodist; have each offered their services to Lieut. Colonel Mansfield as Chaplain to accompany his men to the front. The Chaplaincy has been given to Mr. Roberts who is with the troops at Sussex camp. THE steamer Bonavista, Capt. Anderson, of the Black Diamond Line, arrived from Montreal yesterday evening with freight. She left to-day at 1 o'clock for St. John's, Nfld., via Pictou, and took from this port 10 horses, 10 head of cattle, 30 sheep, 118 barrels pork, 7 barrels, 6 kegs and 2 boxes fruit juice, 25 pairs lard, 2 cases leather, 2 cases harness, 7 tubs butter, 2 cases, etc. ON SUNDAY last another anti-Roman Catholic demonstration occurred at Bay Roberts. The house of William Daley, the leading Roman Catholic trader, was almost demolished. Some of Capt. Henneberry's property was hung over the wharf into the sea. Several Roman Catholic boys and men were assaulted. The Judge of Harbor Grace inflicted a money penalty on the ringleaders. IN another column, the Y. M. C. A. announces the engagement of the celebrated Jubilee Singers from Fisk University, Nashville, Tenn. This company sang by royal command before Her Majesty, the Queen, and before nearly all the crowned heads of Europe and gave abundant satisfaction. As this is the only time they may ever visit Charlottetown, no doubt, as many as possibly can will make an effort to hear them. THE steamer Carroll, Capt. Kelly, Miss Mary McLeod, Miss Katie McLeod, Mr. James A. Gregory, Mr. D. W. Logan, M. R. Neddy, Mrs. John Cairns. SOMERSET VILLAGE, Megantic Co., Quebec, was all burned down on Saturday evening last. About 100 houses were laid in ashes, including M. P. Malhot's residence, the R. C. Church and Presbytery; also, a foundry and cheese factory. Many people are left in a destitute condition. The buildings being mostly all wooden, the fire was spread in different parts of the village by the sparks. There being no pumps the fire could not be got under control. THE SS Clifton arrived here from Barrow, yesterday, making the passage in twelve days. She is a fine three masted steamer of 2500 tons gross, and 1716 tons net register, and 340 feet long, and has a flush deck. She has a midship saloon with accommodation for about twelve cabin passengers, which can be increased to carry any number required. She will call here on the return trip in about a fortnight, and will sail for London about the 4th or 5th of June. We understand several applications have already been made for freight and cabin passage. THE British ironclad Canada arrived at Halifax from New York on the 18th inst. The preliminary investigation into the conduct of officers of the warship Garnet, during Boyton's torpedo experiment in New York harbor has been concluded. The entry on duty has been summarily sentenced to forty-two days close confinement for neglecting to prevent Boyton's approach to the ship or to promptly report the incident. The midshipman on duty has been acquitted, but Lieut. Gardner who allowed Boyton to go after having him in charge, instead of taking him a prisoner on board the Garnet, is to be formerly court-martialed. The general opinion among the blue jackets is that the entry having been made a scapegoat of the officer will get clear.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

THE RIEL REBELLION

Terrible Battle with Poundmaker.

OTTER AGAIN ATTACKS HIS FORCES,

And Captures the Chief and 129 Prisoners.

OTTER'S LOSS 40 KILLED.

TORONTO, May 19. A despatch from St. Paul, Minn., says Col. Otter, with the Queen's Own Regiment, attacked Poundmaker yesterday, and after a severe battle captured him and one hundred and twenty-nine of his braves. During the battle twenty-one Canadians and nineteen Englishmen (probably Mounted Police) were killed. The battle was fought at Eagle Hills.

HOW IS RIEL TO BE DISPOSED OF?

Gen. Middleton thinks him a Religious Monomaniac.

All Prominent Rebels but Dumont Captured.

WINNIPEG, May 20. A despatch from Batoche states that Riel declines to be interviewed. He is only seen by General Middleton. His conversation continually drifts into religious subjects. He presents an undignified appearance. Riel says the rebels at the battle of Batoche numbered seven hundred. General Middleton has telegraphed to Ottawa for instructions as to the disposal of Riel. The General thinks he is a religious monomaniac. Nearly all the prominent rebels who took part in the battle of Batoche have been secured, except Gabriel Dumont. It is understood that the officers of the Brigade offered \$1,500 reward for the capture of Riel, and a similar reward for the capture of Dumont. Eighty men surrendered to a priest at Batoche. This priest now says that only fourteen rebels were killed in the battle, and twenty wounded. The first estimate of the loss (published above) was made on the misstatement of a number of half breeds who fear Riel will not be punished. They want to petition the Government to hang him. General Middleton will advance on Battleford with a large mounted force as soon as possible. He says he must punish Poundmaker, Big Bear and Beardy, and burn their camps.

HORRIBLE ABUSE OF WOMEN.

A War of Extermination Threatened.

WINNIPEG, May 20. Hostile Indians are reported to be committing many depredations in the North Saskatchewan country. Mrs. Delaney, who was captured by Indians at Fort Pitt, is dead. Her treatment by her captors was horrible. She was passed around from one band to another and squaws cut her to pieces. Mrs. Gowandock, who was also captured at Fort Pitt, is owned by a buck. She is still alive. There is fearful excitement among the troops under Gen. Strange. Threats are freely made that if the reported abuse of women is confirmed a war of extermination will be waged against the Indians under Big Bear.

Nothing Heard of the Battle at Winnipeg.

WINNIPEG, May 19. Nothing is known here at this hour of Poundmaker's defeat. Gabriel Dumont has not yet been captured. He has probably escaped to Birch Hills, where he will fight. Latest reports place the casualties at the battle of Batoche to be: Canadians killed..... 9 wounded..... 42 Rebels killed..... 83 wounded..... 173 General Middleton is now marching on Prince Albert, and goes thence to Battleford.

No Confirmation of Otter's Battle.

WINNIPEG, May 20. The battle between Col. Otter and Poundmaker, and the reported capture of the chief and his braves, telegraphed from St. Paul, has not been confirmed.

Burning the Country.

BATTLEFORD, May 20. Scouts are out burning the country around Eagle Hills, to prevent the Indians from obtaining cover.

To be Lord Chancellor.

LONDON, May 20. Sir Vernon Harcourt will soon succeed Lord Shelbourn as Chancellor.

Hudson Bay Navigation.

HALIFAX, May 20. The arctic steamer Alert sails for the Hudson Bay on Tuesday next. Captain Adams, the famous whaler and Arctic navigator goes with her to report on the feasibility and practicability of an ocean route from the Bay to Europe.

The New Mahdi defeats El Mahdi.

DONGOLA, May 20. The General of El Mahdi, who was recently defeated by the new Mahdi in Kordofan, has joined the ranks of the new Mahdi, and will hereafter fight against the False Prophet. The thermometer stands 112 in the shade. The British troops bid good-bye to the Sudan to-morrow.

Gen. Wolsley Sails for England.

SUAKIN, May 20. General Wolsley sailed for England to-day. There is a great increase of sickness among the troops. The Shropshire regiment will form a permanent garrison here.

An Extraordinary Naval Demonstration.

LONDON, May 20. Fourteen first-class ironclads have been ordered to engage in an extraordinary naval demonstration and torpedo exercises in Bantry Bay. A Craak's Feat. NEW YORK, May 20. Professor E. Dium performed the feat of jumping from Brooklyn Bridge to the Hudson River to-day, a distance of 135 feet high. He swam to a tug-boat which was waiting to pick up and land him.
