THE Governor General and Princess Louise will visit St. John, N. B., on the 15th of August.

SIR LEONARD TILLEY has a letter in the Manchester newspapers giving his views of the operation of the Canadian tariff.

SIXTEEN persons were killed by the heat in Charleston, S. C., on the 19th inst. The temperature at 2 p. m., was 111 in the shade.

THE Crapaud Tea on the 9th, in aid of St. John's Church and Rectory, was very successful. The returns in the hands of the committee amount to over \$300.

THE Grit organs say the prospect of an abundant harvest in Canada was one of the things that influenced the money lenders of England to subscribe Sir L. Tilley's loan on unprecedentedly liberal terms. Perhaps so.

THE ship *St. Bernard's*, owned by Mr. W. D. Lovitt, of Yarmouth, N. S., was wrecked at Flushing, while on passage from New York to Antwerp. The captain, pilot and five of the crew were drowned. This ship was insured in Yarmouth offices for forty thousand dollars. Her loss is a great blow to Yarmouth shipping and insurance.

THE N. P.—In a Barbadoes trade circular to hand, we observe the significant item "Sugar sales are made principally for Canadian account." A year ago such a statement could not have appeared; a cargo of sugar to Canada was indeed a *rara avis*. Sugar sales on Canadian account mean dollars to Canadian workmen, and long may trade circulars contain them.—*Pictou Standard*.

QUICK WORK—The steamer "Montague" left Georgetown on Monday last at 10 o'clock, a. m., steamed to Pictou, entered on the Marine Slip, got fully sheathed with copper sheathing, and was back to her position on the Georgetown Ferry at 4 o'clock on Tuesday morning. We congratulate Mr. Fairchild on this expeditious performance, and think he may fairly challenge competitors in this line of business.—*COM.*

AN ONTARIO eloping couple have come to grief. Mrs. McCallum a married woman, of Brockville, eloped with James MacDonald. The party left Brockville, going to Morristown, Syracuse, Rome, Briarhill, and finally to Guelph. While in the latter place the prisoner took \$100 from her and refused to return it. She then went to Toronto with him and had him arrested. He was taken before a magistrate on Thursday last, and asking for summary trial, was committed to prison for nine months.

BEFORE leaving Sable Island, the passengers of the ill-fated steamer *City of Virginia* passed the following resolution: "We desire to express our appreciation of the comforts furnished and the protection afforded us by the Dominion of Canada. We take the greater pleasure in doing this, as but two of our number are subjects of that Government. Without the provision thus made, the trials of our situation would have been much increased, if, indeed, they could have been borne."
