Let's Talk It Over

A Prince County Viewpoint

There seems to be some dissatisfaction with the way the new Trans-Canada Highway joins the highway that runs into Summerside. Motorists from Summerside are saying that the junction does not attract sufficient notice. If Summerside drivers almost passed this junction without realizing it was the turn-off into the Prince County capital, a strange and much more likely to do so. What looked like a wily solution to the problem was put forth by a member of the Summerside Board of Trade, but it is possible no very drastic change can be made at this late date. We do not know the Government's plans regarding this junction but hope that with the aid of conspicuous signs and an information bureau at this location the unsatisfactory situation can be greatly improved.

We have seen our first rural musical festival and enjoyed it very much. The moving spirits in this worthwhile project are to be congratulated on their achievement thus far. Some really excellent talent was shown in the various music and elocution numbers. This festival which was held in the auditorium of the Summerside High School is beginning to get a bit unwieldy because of the large number of entries. This is a healthy condition, but something will have to be done about it, nevertheless. The directors are considering two alternatives: elimination contests at the schools, or a two-day program. The first seems the more sensible way to handle this situation as it makes for a better quality of performance. There is the other consideration however, that if you used local judges at the preliminary contests in the schools, there would always be some who would consider that they had been dealt with unfairly.

We hope the leaders of this project which, taking everything into consideration, has been an outstanding success, will overlook a little constructive criticism. We think the sessions might get under way a little more promptly. Perhaps the weather was partly to blame for the late start this year, but the fact remains that functions of this kind (and every other kind for that matter), should begin as advertised. We owe that to our cash customers who are living in a very busy world. It is true we Islanders pride ourselves on a rather more leisurely way of living than exists in some parts of the world, but promptness is still a virtue worth cultivating.

As the acoustics of Summerside High School auditorium are known to be somewhat short of the ideal, we think a loud speaker system should have been used at the festival. It was difficult sometimes to hear the adjudicators give their findings, and some of the smaller contestants could not be heard at the back of the hall at all. We were sitting at the back and failed to hear one of the participants who won first prize in an elocution class. The adjudicator sitting half way up the aisle, was able to judge all contestants without trouble, but as a charge is very rightly made for admission, it would be better if all the audience could hear all the performers, wouldn't it?

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O'Leary Legion Plans Armistice Day

—On Armistice Sunday, Nov. 11, the special speaker for the O'Leary Canadian Legion will be Squadron Leader G. C. Peake of the R.C.A.F. base at Summerside. He will give a special address at the Verdun Theatre, O'Leary.

The veterans will assemble at the O'Leary Legion Home at 10:30 a.m. and will then march to the cenotaph, picking up the Sunday School children of the O'Leary United Church, the O'Leary Nazarene Church and the Knutsford Baptist Church enroute as well as the Boy Scouts and the Wolf Cubs. At 11 a.m. the two minutes silence will be observed at the monument and Squadron Leader Peake will call out the names of those for whom the memorial wreaths will be placed at the monument. Rev. C. O. Howlet, who lost a son in the Second World War will lead in prayer. A short address will be given by Rev. W. G. Dickson.

It is hoped that the padre of the O'Leary Legion, Rev. J. R. McMahon will be able to attend. The parade will then march to the O'Leary theatre where the special message will be delivered by S. L. Feake. In the evening the Legion members will march to the O'Leary United Church along with the Boy Scouts, the Wolf Cubs and the C.G.I.T. where a special flag will be donated to the church in memory of six boys from the community who paid the supreme sacrifice in World War II. An honor roll will also be unveiled, the guest speaker being Brigadier W. W. Reid of Charlottetown.

The public has been cordially invited to attend the Armistice Day services. Veterans will assemble on Monday evening at the O'Leary Legion Home for their annual banquet.

—The town of Kensington was shocked when on October 8th, 1951, it became known that Mrs. Ben Cameron had been instantly killed by a car while on a week-end visit to the home of her daughter.
