Hillcrest Forms Scout, Cub Troop

SUMMERSIDE — The First Hillcrest Troop of Boy Scouts of Canada was formed recently at a meeting of the Hillcrest Community Council.

A request to sponsor a cub-

troop had been submitted to the council by the ADC (for training) Bob Shalpin.

Mr. Shalpin explained to the council that he had on hand, ready and willing, enough trained leaders to begin one or two packs. These leaders were previously assisting with Selmon Park packs.

A group committee was formed. E/L Bill Chapman and Sgt. Don Hillas were appointed as president and secretary treasurer respectively.

For the information of boys who have not yet enrolled, the age for cubs is eight years old or grade three in school. The boys will receive subscriptions to the "Canadian Boy", a boy's magazine along with the free accident policy for their registration fee.

Hospital Fund Campaign Nets Minimum Objective

SUMMERSIDE — The Prince County Hospital Extension Fund Campaign has reached its minimum objective of \$250,000.00. This announcement was made yesterday morning by R. T. Holman, president of the hospital board of trustees, who said that due to the lateness in organizing some of the outlying districts the campaign is not actually over. He indicated he would have a further statement at a later date.

Reporting that the actual cash received to date amounts to \$138,000.00, Mr. Holman expressed confidence that when the pledges have been paid there will be sufficient money on hand to cover the costs of the campaign and still have the needed \$250,000.00 in the fund. He said he is also hopeful there will be sufficient additional money to purchase some equipment which is badly needed but which the hospital would have to do without.

Mr. Holman also stated that campaign headquarters in the annex will be closed at the end of this week and that payments on pledges may be made at the hospital office or at the offices of R. T. Holman Ltd., and Rogers and Arnett Ltd. The support of the campaign by the public has been remarkable, said Mr. Holman. He also expressed appreciation on behalf of the board of trustees to all canvassers and workers. "The co-operation received from all quarters has been outstanding," he said, obviously pleased with the results.

The trustee board president said that in addition to carrying out the campaign, it has been necessary to hold many meetings and conduct many negotiations with architects, consultants, the Hospital Services Commission

and the federal Department of Health. He said he was happy to report that these negotiations are now almost complete and he is hoping construction will be underway by late summer.

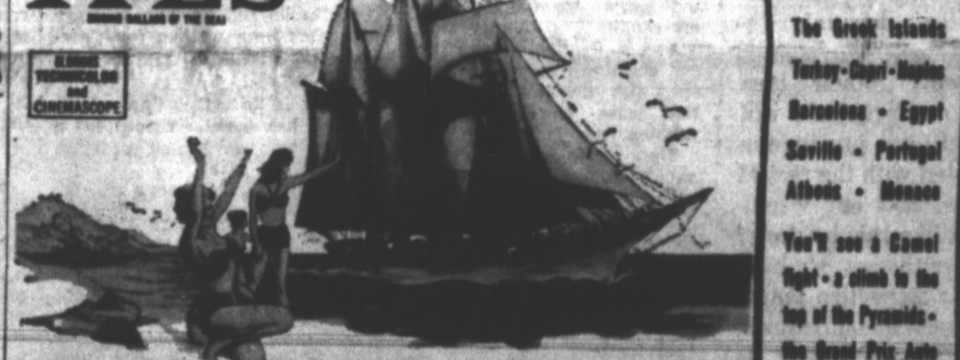
