

Night Ball Game To Follow Cadet Inspection

Memorial Field will be a busy spot Monday, June 1st. At 10:00 a.m. Queen Square Cadets will be inspected there by Brig. W. W. Reid, D.S.O., E.D., in the afternoon at 2:30 Prince Street cadets will be inspected by Brig. Reid and at 7:30 p.m. Brig. G. G. K. Peake, D.S.O., E.D., will inspect the West Kent School Corps. At 8:45 p.m. the official opening of night baseball in the Province takes place with due ceremony followed by a seven-inning game which will bring together RCAF Royals of Summerside and our own Intermediate Abbies.

Officials making arrangements for the opening are hoping the weather man will co-operate and warm up the atmosphere for the evening's activities, which they feel will be a most fitting way to observe Coronation Eve. At 8:45, players of both teams and officials will line first and third base line, the RCAF Band will parade in to the field and take up position near the pitcher's mound. Local dignitaries including Senator J. Walter Jones, Hon. A. W. Matheson and Mayor J. D. Stewart along with visiting and other officials will take up their positions at home plate and the opening ceremony will get under way with Bill Reid, Director of Physical Fitness, as master of ceremonies. After a short ceremony, Mayor Stewart will officially declare night ball open in Charlottetown and it is hoped Hon. R. E. Macdonald will be able to attend and throw over the opening pitch to get the game under way.

Fans have been talking about this opening night game for a long while now and it is expected a bumper crowd will be on hand to see the opener and show by their attendance and admissions that they are back of this most recent of our sport ventures.

Death last night claimed another prominent man from the athletic world when Major Tom Rogers passed away at the Prince Edward Island Hospital following a prolonged illness. Tom, who maintained an interest in every line of athletic endeavor, was particularly interested in hockey and horse racing and down through the years he gave of his talents and time to help develop each into a flourishing field of activity.

It was his work with hockey during the latter years of his life that we are most familiar and about which we feel most qualified to speak. It was mainly through his efforts back in the summer of 1950 that the Islanders Hockey Club was organized. His was the guiding hand throughout that first summer when the Islanders made plans to venture back into senior hockey and hired Murph Chamberlain as their first coach. He was the pilot of the ship that first year when the Islanders came within an ace of winning the Maritime Championship.

Spahn Pitches Braves To 4-0 Shutout Win

Warren Spahn, accustomed in past years to working long hours in lost causes, is enjoying a pleasant change in circumstances this season.

The long-time ace southpaw of Boston Braves when the club was walloping in the National League's second division has been plagued by injuries most of this spring, as the Braves were setting up house-keeping in their new Milwaukee home.

But instead of making a bee-line for the cellar in the absence of their money pitcher, the Braves came up with a flock of talented rookies and newly-inspired veterans and established themselves in first place.

Spahn, who hasn't been able to go the route in weeks in his infrequent appearances on the hill, finally found himself Tuesday pitching a four-hit shutout as the Braves defeated Cincinnati Reds 4-0.

The shutout was the 28th of Spahn's career, placing him third among active National League pitchers behind Dutch Leonard of Chicago and Ken Raffensberger of Cincinnati.

Spahn's performance enabled the Braves to boost their lead to 1 1/2 games over St. Louis Cardinals, who split a twin bill with Chicago Cubs. Red Schoendienst drove in three runs with a homer and two singles to pace the Cards to a 6-3 victory in the opener.

In the second game the Cubs overcame a two-run deficit to win 3-2 as Turk Lown outpitched Wilmer (Vinegar Bend) Mizell.

Bud Ramsay To Fight Jones On June 8 Card

LeRoy Jones, a colored lightweight from Halifax has agreed to fight "Bud" Ramsay of Summerside in a six round bout on the Harry Poulton-Gil Edwards fight card here on Monday, June 8.

Jones, who tips the scales at 137 pounds, is a hard puncher who has fought with such a well known performer as Johnny Hayden of New Glasgow. Hayden won a decision over the slugging Halifax boxer.

Ramsay, well known for his free swinging ring battles with Bud Lund, has been training for several weeks and is in excellent condition.

Meanwhile Austin Squarebriggs, the Charlottetown lightweight, is fast rounding into shape for his second title bout with Mitch Krawada of Sydney on the Poulton-Gil Edwards card.

The fight is a big one for Squarebriggs who has been offered a shot at the winner of the Maritime lightweight championship between Al Hogan and Archie (Beary) Hart. This fight is being staged on May 30.

The 22-year-old Squarebriggs has had a successful ring record since he first stepped inside the square circle at Joey MacDonald's Sporting Club.

Arcaro To Ride In Queen's Plate

TORONTO (CP)—Eddie Arcaro one of the all-time great jockeys has been commissioned to ride for Toronto millionaire E. P. Taylor in the \$200,000-added Queen's Plate June 2, it was announced Monday. The 37-year-old Arcaro never has raced before in Canada.

It was not known which Taylor horse-Lively Action or Canadiana he would ride.

Taylor said that he had no criticism of jockey Jose Vina who was aboard 4th-place Canadiana in the trial Saturday.
