Dis Governors Lamed As Session Annual Ends

The Lions International at multiple district 41 ended its 35th annual convention here last night with the Governors-elect banquet and ball at the Basil Recreation Centre.

Announced were the results of the parade which took place Monday. First, second and third in the bands competition, which was open to only non-professionals (i.e., no service or permanent bands) went to New Glasgow, Bellarain, and Parrsboro respectively. In the non-commercial floats class, Moncton took first place, Pugwash was second, and Dorchester, St. Peter's and Georgetown tied for third.

Equality Of Opportunity Seen Quebec's Answer

Equality of opportunity for the "bright, energetic, and idealistic" young people of Quebec is badly needed to combat the voices of the illusion of separatism," said Dr. Wilder Penfield speaking at luncheon during closing day of the Canadian Clubs Association meeting in Charlottetown yesterday.

It is predicted that when we have entered safely into the second century of Confederation it will be clear, even to the most orthodox of Ontario's Anglo-patriots that the quiet revolution in Quebec has produced a great educational advance."

He referred to the surge forward in growth, development and modernization called for by the provincial government which brought an "indicated intention" from the clergy of withdrawing from some of its secular positions in education.

Quoting Lucien Piche, vice-rector of the University of Montreal, he said that this change turned inward the attentions of the French Canadians, and the youth is "picked up with ardor the challenge of reforming the entire structure of their society."

BETTER BUSINESS AT S'IDE DONOR CLINIC

Officials Emphasize Urgent Need For Blood

SUMMERSIDE — Prince County was short of its quota by 49 donors at the completion of two days of Red Cross blood donor clinics at Summerside last night. Yesterday's afternoon and evening sessions both produced excellent results but the poor response at Monday's two clinics put the area "in the red" for the first of its two clinics during P.E.I.'s "Centennial Year."

Provincial Red Cross officials said last night that while the results of the two days of clinics at Summerside was disappointing, residents in the four other counties of the province where clinics are to be held today and tomorrow will have an opportunity to overcome the Summerside deficit by turning out in large numbers to exceed the quotas for their own localities.

Today's clinics are at the RCMP Station this morning where the quota is 225 donors and P.O. Lois A. Wagner is again the co-ordinator. Tomorrow's clinic will be held at the Women's Institute hall in Alberton under the sponsorship of Mrs. Alberton. The Royal Canadian Legion with Fred Hastings as the chairman aims an objective of at least 150 donors.

The blood obtained in this province this week must meet the needs in hospitals in Nova Scotia, as well as in P.E.I. for the next 10 days.

Sharing Is Key To Citizenship Speaker Tells Polio Meeting

SUMMERSIDE — "Sharing is the key to citizenship," said Evelyn Cudmore, provincial director of Red Cross Water Safety and First Aid in addressing last night's annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island chapter of the Polioymylosis Association, held at the Tartan Restaurant here.

Mrs. Cudmore said that a world today exists on the idea of sharing, and that it was important for people to realize this at all times.

Speaking on behalf of the United Fund, she said that it was hard to give and have the donation shared among all charitable organizations, but this is necessary, she said, if all these groups are to survive.

The meeting was chaired by Mrs. Cudmore, who reported on the organization's activities over the past year.

The report of the treasurer, James Perry, showed that the organization operated at a surplus of \$1,448 last year and that operating expenses for the crippled children's camp last summer were in the vicinity of \$5,000.

Camp committee chairman, Inspector A. S. MacMillan stated that Bill MacMillan had been selected to act as camp director. In addition it was pointed out that Marjorie Landtler will again be engaged as a counselor at the camp. Miss Linklater, who was in charge of the presentation of their impending marriage.

It was the opinion of the reporter who answered the phone that the speaker was slightly inebriated. In the background could be heard raucous music and loud voices.

The speaker was most adamant that the term "Young Canadians" be used in referring to himself and his comrades. He would make no reply to questions as to who he or his companions were, or where they lived.

Police were notified of the incident.
