### Island Hog Producers Briefed On Ontario Research Centre

A fairly large number of Island hog producers yesterday heard W.K. Meyer, general nutrition manager for the Shur Gain feed division of Canada Packers, discuss nutrition with a special reference to swine. He spoke at the Baseline Recreation centre here. With him was George Robson, Maple, Ontario. Dr. F.S. Warren, Canada department of agriculture experimental station at Nappan, N.S. discussed grain production. The company has built a large research centre at Maple, Ontario, where they're testing various approaches to nutrition with pure bred swine. Later, Mr. Meyer said, they'll be doing similar research work with cross bred hogs in future. It's a many-sided effort, it was explained, consisting of breeding, cross breeding, management, such as housing — they're testing various methods of farrowing the little pigs, and for finishing them. Research done in limiting the feed intake of pigs is interesting. This is done from the time the animals are 100 pounds until they are marketed. By limiting the energy intake, "we are able to lessen the tendency to back fat," it was explained. And this is one of the things that must be done to get top grade carcasses. The effort at leaner carcasses is aimed at improving the bacon and pork products in general, Mr. Meyer explained. They're confident they're on the right track at Maple. "We think we can improve the quality of carcasses — the number of top grades — by as much as 30 percent, by this process of special diets and limiting or controlling the feed intake," he said. "We also feel we can improve the feed conversion — the amount of feed needed to produce a pound of grain — by as close to one-half pound, which is important from an economic standpoint. The average conversion ration would run, perhaps, about three and one-half pounds feed to one pound gain."

If a man is able to get a pound of gain for 3.2 pounds feed, he's doing pretty good, Mr. Meyer observed, although in certain instances they have achieved a conversion rate of as good as a pound of gain to 2.75 pounds feed, he told The Guardian. And that, he believes, is just about as good as it has been done anywhere. (The general conversion rate would probably run to three and one-half pounds to four pounds of feed per pound gain, though not among the better hog feeders.)

They're working with early weaning at Maple, removing the sow from the pigs at three to four weeks of age. The youngsters are exposed to creep feeding at 10 days of age. Some of them eat as much as three pounds by four weeks, when they are weaned, though some have not eaten perhaps more than one-half pound. Temporary setbacks when the sow is removed are still a problem, but the researchers are working on it. There's still a lot to be learned and developed, said the man whose specialty is animal nutrition. George Robson spoke on swine housing — he's manager of the Shur Gain Swine farm at Maple. Agriculture Minister Andrew MacIsaac spoke at the noon luncheon and told the visitors that Island hogs have topped the nation for many years now in percentage of top carcasses. Presiding at the general session was Gordon Higgins, Summerside.

OTTAWA — Defeated Kings' Liberal candidate John Mulhally said here he and his family plan to stay in Ottawa during the winter to enable his children to complete their school year. Mr. Mulhally has been clearing out his West Block office these past few days following his defeat on Nov. 8 by Melvin McQuaid. Mr. Mulhally said he still has deep interest in politics and hopes to run again in a future election. There have been suggestions he may be appointed to the Senate or be given an executive post with a Liberal cabinet minister. Alternatively, he may seek a teaching position on the staff of an Ottawa school. This week Mr. McQuaid and David MacDonald, the winner in Prince, were in Ottawa to attend the Conservative caucus. They have also been apartment hunting and interviewing secretaries preparatory to the opening of Parliament on Jan. 18. Mr. MacDonald has submitted his resignation to his congregation effective the end of this year but will assist in the church until that time. He said in an interview that his major interest in Parliament will be with social welfare legislation. Mr. McQuaid, a former provincial treasurer, said he was most vitally interested in federal-provincial tax sharing arrangements and would be exerting every effort to try to get a better share of tax revenues for Prince Edward Island.

## Second Four-Year Term Levied By Magistrate

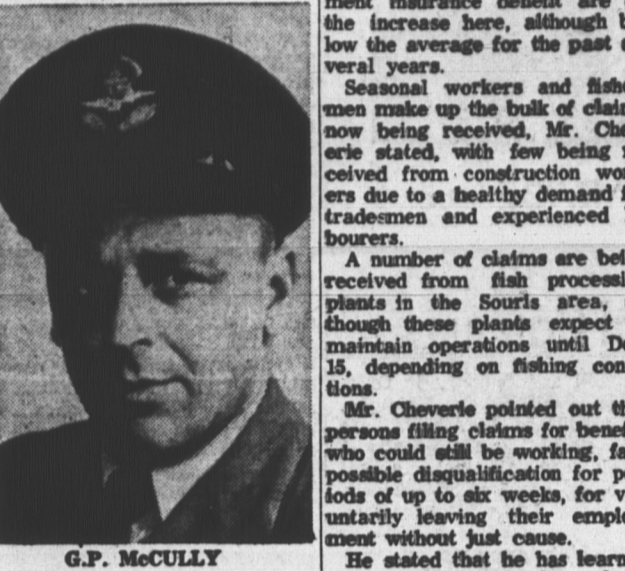
**SUMMERSIDE** — A resident of this town, Carl Joseph Franklin Arsenault, who was sentenced to four years in penitentiary Tuesday on a charge of break, entry and theft in the home of Misses Jenny and Estelle Bowness last May, was sentenced to another four years yesterday on a second charge of break, entry and theft in September. The sentences will run concurrently. Arsenault, who is 26 years of age and married, changed his plea from not guilty to guilty yesterday and re-elected trial by magistrate after pleading not guilty at an earlier hearing and electing trial by judge and jury. Prior to his change of plea yesterday one Crown witness was called to give testimony. RCMP Sgt. Peter S. Gazy, of the crime detection lab in Sackville, N.B., told of examining a portion of the safe broken open in the store of Harold Phillips, Freeland, where the theft occurred, and finding marks on it. He stated he had made test markings on soft lead with a bar found near the scene and had found that under microscopic examination the marks on the lead were identical to those on the safe. A Summerside youth, Toussaint Bernard, who had also pleaded not guilty to the same charge, changed his plea yesterday and was given a two-year suspended sentence by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald. It was pointed out to the court that this youth had never been convicted of a criminal offence and Sgt. Harry McKay of the town police stated that the accused had never caused any trouble in the town and to his knowledge, had always been of good behaviour. A number of conditions attached to the suspended sentence were as follows: That he enter into a recognizance bond of \$2,000 with two sureties of \$1,000 each; that he be in every night by midnight unless given written permission to remain out later; that he refrain of all alcoholic beverages and that he be of good behaviour during this time.

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### Appointed Chief Instructor, Pilot

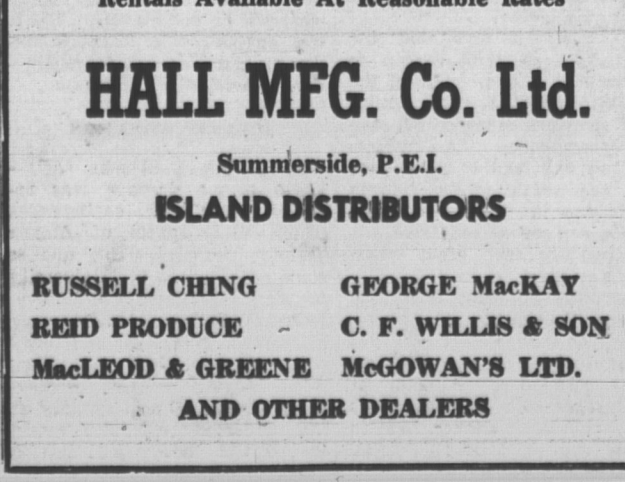
