## Council Refuses Approval To Make Decision Binding

The city council refused to approve an agreement that would make final and binding the decision of the conciliation board in the current dispute between the city and city employees, last night at a special meeting of the council.  
At the beginning of the meeting, Councillor J.P. Nicholson, chairman of the Labor Relations Board, informed the council that the conciliation board was meeting at that moment and that the city employees, Local 501 of the Canadian Union of Public Employees, had agreed to accept the board's decision as final. He said that Frank Curtis, representing the city on the board, wanted the council's decision whether or not the city would accept the board's decision which has not yet been arrived at as final.  
The report and recommendations of the conciliation board are not binding on the disputing parties unless both give their written agreement to accept this.  
The council voted informally, 7-3, against signing the agreement which would bind the city to accept the board's decision. This means that both the city and the union have the right to accept or reject the conciliation board's recommendations when they are drawn up.  
**READS RECOMMENDATION**  
Dr. Kenneth Parker, superintendent of city schools, read the council a recommendation that the city purchase of band instruments for setting up junior, senior and adult bands in the city with school grades from seven to 12 participating. After considerable discussion during which Mayor Cox pointed out that the city has as yet no Centennial

project whatever, the motion was passed that the city make application to the provincial government that the purchase of band instruments be their project.  
Dr. Parker also asked for the council's opinion on the choice of a name for the city's new senior high school. No one objected to "Charlottetown Centennial High School," the name mentioned by Dr. Parker, and several councillors praised its appropriateness.  
Some controversy broke out when councillor Nicholson read to the council a request that the city give a letter of intent to Actors' Equity Association guaranteeing them \$14,000 on behalf of the Fathers of Confederation Memorial Trust for the Charlottetown Festival. The purpose of the letter is to guarantee that actors in the Festival would be paid in the event that the Festival is a financial failure. Councillor Arthur Gormley objected to "giving 14 thousand dollars in taxpayer's money to a bunch of actors from Ontario."  
Councillor Nicholson explained that the guarantee was simply in the event of a financial failure of the Festival, that this was unlikely, and that the city would deduct any amount it had to pay the Actors' Association from its grant to the Confederation Centre in 1967. He explained further that the Centre would have to post its own bond, in effect a certified cheque for \$14,000, if the city did not guarantee the money. If, as seems most likely, the summer Festival is a success, the guarantee would terminate at the Festival's close and neither the city nor the Centre would lose money. In any event, the city could not lose a penny through its guarantee, since any money they had to pay the Actors' Association, plus interest, would be deducted from the city's grant to the Centre next year.  
Councillor Ivan Doherty suggested that unions, especially actors' unions, were the worst people in the world to deal with.  
The motion to give the letter of guarantee to the Actors' Equity Association was passed, 7 to 3, with councillors Doherty, Gormley and Arthur Wright dissenting.  
The council approved unanimously the calling of tenders for the sale of bonds in the amount of \$550,000. Councillor Nicholson said that the bond market was not good at present, but there were no indications of improvement in the foreseeable future, and the bond issue was absolutely necessary for the carrying on of city business.  
Five other routine resolutions were approved by the council, including: that a storm sewer be constructed from Seaman's Beverages to Queen Street on Water Street; that a concrete sidewalk be constructed on the south side of Grafton Street between Church and the war memorial; that a ten foot strip be paved on the west end of Rochford Square for parallel parking, and another on the north side; and two resolutions concerning town planning.  
The mayor and all councillors were present at the meeting.

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### Color Film Is Planned

HALIFAX (CP) — A color film depicting the history of the Anglican Church in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island is planned as the centennial project of the diocesan synod.  
The concluding session of the synod Thursday voted approval for Rt. Rev. W.W. David, Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia, to proceed with plans for production of the film.  
Bishop David said that investigation has already been made for a cameraman to work on the film.  
The Synod also authorized the diocesan board of religious education to make a study of religious education in the schools of the diocese to see if steps might be taken in co-operation with other religious bodies, to strengthen the educational curriculum in the area.  
Archdeacon J.R. Davies of Charlottetown, urged the delegates to regard seriously the proposed union of the United and Anglican churches, scheduled to come before the general council of the United Church this fall.

**Collision Sends Driver To Hospital**  
MONTAGUE — A car-truck collision at the intersection of the 46 Road and the road leading to St. Peter's Corner yesterday afternoon resulted in one man being rushed to the Kings County Memorial Hospital at Montague for treatment.  
The accident occurred when a car reported to have been driven by Mr. Arsenault from the western part of the province entered the intersection to come in contact with a truck hauling asphalt, driven by Stanley Collings and owned by Morley Anear. Damage to the car was extensive and it is said, cannot be repaired while the truck, which left the highway and plunged into the head of the Cardigan River, is said to be extensively damaged and posing a problem to return it to the highway.  
It was thought that Mr. Arsenault was not seriously hurt although he is to remain in hospital overnight.
