

Barns, Shed Lost In Cardigan Area

MONTAGUE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN
 Two large barns and a machine shed were completely destroyed by fire last night near Cardigan.
 The buildings, property of Blair Atoll Farms and owned by Kelsa Gordon were situated about two miles from Cardigan on the lower Georgetown road. The fire was discovered about 9:15 by William Dargwell who resides with the Gordons.
 In less than half an hour the barns and shed were completely demolished and sparks caught a machine shed about 350 feet away.
 Although neighbours were able to save the machinery from this shed they were not aware of household furniture in the upper region of the building. The furniture was unsecured and belongs to H.F. Sanderson, brother-in-law of Kelsa Gordon.
 The Montague fire department and RCMP Montague detachment responded to the call but were unable to do anything to save the buildings.
 Cause of the fire was unknown and some insurance was carried on the buildings. All animals were saved from the barns and Mr. Gordon was away purchasing hogs at the time of the fire.
 Mrs. Daisy Gordon, mother of Kelsa had just arrived from Ontario a few minutes before the fire.

Souris Fisheries Show To Feature 30 Displays

 Nearly 30 displays have been entered in the Fisheries Exhibition and Regatta to be held in Souris July 4. These displays will include 12 from leading firms in the fishing industry in the Maritimes and at least six from Charlottetown while the remainder will be from the Kings County area. It was stated last night by John Mully, chairman of the exhibition.
 The big program will include a fish filling contest, a fresh fish display, a trap building demonstration, dory race and water rescue and life saving demonstration. The fish filling contest will include samples of all fish caught in the Gulf of St. Lawrence.
 Some of the more unusual fish in this display will be the ocean perch or red fish, pollock, catfish, dogfish and other varieties too numerous to mention.
 The local firms will display all their products, while the mainland firms will display all the equipment used by both the inshore and off-shore fishmen.
 The Fish and Game Association of P.E.I. and the department of fisheries will also have displays for this big occasion.
 The RCMP will have a patrol boat in port and the navy, is sending the HMCS Mallard a patrol boat on July 3 for the show. The boat with 22 men aboard under Chief Petty Officer Walker Brown will leave Souris on July 3.

Old Debris Slows Wharf Project

Masses of tangled, partially rotted cribwork from old tumbledown wharves have forced a halt to the driving of steel for the new Department of Transport wharf at the foot of Queen Street, Richard (Dick) Becker, project manager reported yesterday.
 Steel driving first got underway a few weeks ago on the west side of the shore end and after about 30 feet had been driven, first signs of trouble were found.
 Mr. Becker said that despite the old cribwork, it would be possible to be a new wharf in a few years when the material on the bottom sets further, it may allow mud slides to take place and this could result in the steel work becoming displaced.
CAMP AS SURPRISE
 This type of obstruction came more or less as a surprise he said, as the blueprint of the wharf as supplied by the department failed to give any indication that such obstructions were in the area.
 In addition to the cribwork, the clam type dredge has encountered another obstruction, the exact nature of which has not yet been determined. Mr. Becker was unable to say yesterday whether it was solid rock, a thick hard crust or an extensive concrete slab.

New Hospital Said Needed For Southern Kings Area

MONTAGUE — The need for a new hospital and the need of an emergency outpatient department were the main items on the agenda at the annual meeting of the Kings County Memorial Hospital held June 26 in the Beaver Club Hall, Montague.
 The guest speaker, Dr. O. H. Curtis, of the P. E. I. Hospital Services Commission, in his address pointed out the desirability of a new hospital for the area stating one of the greatest needs was a large outpatient department. He emphasized that careful planning with the best specialist advice should be sought before any hospital building project was started.
 He thanked the administrative staff for their co-operation and assistance during the year.
 Neil Hooley, chairman of the board of trustees, in his report stressed the need for a new hospital for the Southern Kings due to the increased utilization of hospital services since the advent of the hospital insurance plan. He also stressed the need for financial support by the community to take care of capital costs, improvements and purchase of new equipment. These items are not paid for by the hospital services commission, he pointed out.
