Free School Books Stressed By Leader

Social welfare and old age assistance claims, some of which have been held up for as long as two years, are now being paid in part with apologies for the delay and promises of a review. Liberal Leader Alex Campbell declared at a public meeting in O'Leary last night.

Mr. Campbell stressed the Liberal pledge to provide free school books for all students up to grade 11 with a loan plan for high school texts. He said that this probably would mean new books every three years, but he claimed that this was well within the amount that would be available through supplementary grants.

Regarding a Liberal pledge to provide subsidies for fertilizer costs, Mr. Campbell urged all farmers to retain invoices for this season's fertilizer costs.

The Liberal Leader stressed

the points in the Liberal program with respect to housing and tourism.

"With the 90 per cent of federal help now being drawn on by the present government for senior citizen housing without acknowledgement, we shall continue and expand this program," he said, "but we are prepared to go much further in the way of making it possible to expand rural as well as urban housing. Rural people are entitled to the same consideration as urban people. We will see that they get it on terms that will make it possible and desirable," he said.

What the present minister of agriculture told the legislature could not be done with respect to fertilizer subsidies and better rural housing, "we are prepared to say it can and will be done," Mr. Campbell asserted.

SUMMERSIDE — Certification orders covering 16 separate local unions of the construction trades have been signed by Dr. Hubert McNeill, minister of labor.

In making the announcement yesterday, Dr. McNeill said that 22 other local unions are being processed and will be completed within the next few days.

Dr. McNeill stated that amendments to the Industrial Relations Act, passed during the last session of the legislative assembly, allowed for quick action in this field of labor relations. The construction trades have a high turnover of employees and this made it difficult previously for their trades to be organized in unions.

As soon as this problem became apparent, cooperation with organized labor and a number of seminars were held.

Premier Shaw Stakes Out Goal

Premier Walter R. Shaw last night staked out a Conservative Government goal of 7,500 new jobs in the province's economy over the next five years, and linked the objective to his administration's industrial development program.

Speaking at a meeting in New London hall, Premier Shaw said that 1,000 new jobs per year would be needed even to maintain the province's position relative to the rest of Canada.

"If we are to improve our relative position — and we shall — there will be needed 1,500 new jobs per year," Mr. Shaw said.

Conservative labor policies, he said, were based on facts, information, knowledge of the problems and issues, and on positive constructive, realistic goals.

POLICY SPEECH

The Premier opened the last week of the May 30th election campaign here with a major policy speech on labor, documented with "statistical information and projections."

He attacked the Liberal opposition for giving the labor and wages issue "The public relations treatment." The Liberal approach was combined of "equal parts of photographs and platitudes," he said.

"I object that they have not done their homework... they have trifled with the issue. Once you wipe away the veneer, you find there is nothing underneath. There is a lack of depth, background, knowledge. Not only do they not have any answers they do not even know what the questions are."

He described the government's employment goals as "the raw material of our program — the heart and soul of the programs we are launching — to build our basic resources and build industrial development," he said.

VOCATIONAL TRAINING

Forecasting additional vocational training facilities in West Prince and Kings counties, the Premier said it was "not enough" simply to create jobs. "We have to create permanent jobs and good paying jobs."

"There will be progressive increases in the minimum wage; that I pledge I am not putting either a floor or a ceiling on the increases, but the increases are inevitable... to me, it would defeat the whole purpose of an industrial development, and it would retard economic growth if our wage earners did not share

Rivard Reported Questioned On Bodies Found In Quebec

MONTREAL (CP) — Inspector Richard Masson of the provincial police said Tuesday two detectives and a Crown prosecutor have been in Atlanta, Ga., to question the imprisoned Lucien Rivard in connection with the discovery of two bodies near Piedmont, Que. May 11.

Insp. Masson said Crown Prosecutor Charles Cliche and sergeants Roland Gilbert and Denis Viau were returning to Montreal. They had been in Atlanta since Sunday.

The inspector said he "suspected" the questioning of Rivard went forward as scheduled.

He said he hopes that Rivard would shed light on the deaths of Andre Paquette and his girlfriend, Alice Rioux. The man and the woman had been shot. All possible leads had to be checked, said Insp. Masson.

Rivard is serving 20 years in the federal penitentiary at Atlanta after being found guilty last year by a United States court of charges connected with dope smuggling.

Paquette, 44, was implicated in a \$1,400,000 mail-truck hold-up in Montreal two years ago. Miss Rioux was 24.

DISAPPEARED YEAR AGO

Their skeletons were uncovered in the bush near Piedmont, 50 miles north of Montreal. They disappeared late last year. They are reported to have given haven to Rivard following his March, 1965, escape from 1963.

Bordeaux jail in Montreal

Found in Rivard's possession when he was captured in July was \$16,000 which the Bank of Montreal said was part of the loot from the mail-robbery. The bank is suing for possession.
