DEAR SIR.—The Committee appointed by the Medical Staff of the Charlottetown Hospital to prepare an Address to Dr. Canning, previous to his departure from the Island, waited upon that gentleman and read to him the following

ADDRESS:

P. W. G. Canning, Esq., L. R. C. P. S., Edinburgh:—

DEAR SIR.—We, the undersigned Committee, on behalf of the Medical Staff of the Charlottetown Hospital, beg leave to present you with this address, and to express our deep regret at finding that the impaired state of your health compels you to sever your connection with our Hospital. We regard your departure from our midst as a loss both to the Hospital and the public at large, for while, as a skillful physician and surgeon, we hailed you as an important acquisition to our number, we were still more gratified to find in you one who, by the constant observance of the proprieties and amenities of professional intercourse, helped to elevate the tone of our honorable profession. But while we regret the loss of your services, let us indulge the hope that the change of climate and the other external circumstances which your removal from our country will secure, may conduce to the complete restoration of your health, and enable you to pursue such a successful career as your practice amongst us, though unavoidably cut short, would lead us to predict for you in your new field of labor.

His Lordship the Bishop of Charlottetown, the founder and the patron of the Hospital, requests us to inform you that he cordially joins with us in these expressions of good will towards you.

REPLY:

Gentlemen Representatives of the Hospital Staff.

It is indeed with very much regret that I feel obliged to separate myself from you, my friends and colleagues. I had hoped to work with you for years; but circumstances have ordained otherwise, and thus my connection with the Charlottetown Hospital has been prematurely drawn to a close (i. e. actively) after a brief but happy period of service on its staff.

I must thank you, gentlemen of the committee, and those whom you represent, for the courtesy and good feeling that has always existed between us, and which has invariably been extended to me by all connected with the Hospital in our official and private intercourse.

Moreover, I trust that the same good feeling may go on increasing from day to day, for it will assuredly tend most to make this good work (the Hospital) a success.

As regards the Institution itself, I think little need be said about it, for the public have learned to appreciate it; and the fact of its increasing popularity (shown by its full wards and large out-patient attendance) speaks volumes.

I am sure His Lordship, the Bishop of Charlottetown, must feel proud at seeing the Charity he inaugurated prospering in the way it does, and so thoroughly appreciated by all classes and denominations. A more truly Catholic institution could not be conceived!

Finally I thank you and His Lordship the Bishop sincerely, for the kind expressions you have used towards myself and family, for the handsome address presented this day, which I will treasure up as a memento of our friendship, and work in a good cause, and also for the honor conferred upon me of naming me Honorary Physician and Surgeon of the Charlottetown Hospital for life—in my estimation, a very great honor.

I hardly think my services deserve such flattering recognition. However, you my dear friends, appear to think otherwise. For my part I must state that the work of the Hospital has always been appermost in my thoughts, and have thrown whatever little influence and talents I possessed heartily into its service, and only regret I could not show more zeal, by a longer connection with it.

As this is the last official meeting I will attend before leaving the Island, I take this opportunity of publicly bidding you farewell. Wishing God speed to the Charlottetown Hospital in its good work, and also thanking you for your good wishes towards my wife and family.

Weather Bulletin.

Probabilities for the next 24 hours for the Maritime Provinces.

TORONTO, Oct. 6—10 a. m.

Fresh to brisk winds, mostly between south and west, cloudy to fair weather, with rain areas.

We learn with regret that the barns, granaries and outbuildings of Mr. Farquhar McRae, of New Glasgow Road, were burned to the ground on Monday evening. The loss includes all Mr. McRae's farming implements and all his crops. It is estimated at over two thousand dollars in cash—the savings and accumulation of many years of labor. The house was saved with the greatest difficulty. The origin of the fire is unknown.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Oct. 4.

A portion of the floors of St. Aloysius Catholic Church (Jesus), at Manchester, collapsed yesterday during Mass, allowing a large number of people to fall to the main floor. Several persons are reported killed and many others injured.

The "Times" says: "Wherever Parnell and his fellow agitators go they have country in flame behind them. The Land League has extended its organization to Great Britain, and branches have been and are being formed in several large towns. Meetings will be held in winter throughout country to extend principles of League."

CANDAHAR, Oct. 4.

The female relatives of Abdurrahman Khan have been refused permission to go to Cabul. The Ameer is about to send Shere Ali's brother to Candahar as Governor.

LONDON, Oct. 4.

The county inspectors of Lancashire have reported that pleuro pneumonia exists among the swine, and fever continues to spread.

DUBLIN, Oct. 4.

The Parnell demonstration at Cork, on Sunday, was the largest ever seen in that section since the days of Daniel O'Connell. Mr. Parnell left the train at Blarney, six miles from Cork. He was accompanied thence by a large escort of tenant farmers on horseback. An address of welcome was presented, and an enormous procession with bands and banners proceeded to Cork. At Wellington Bridge Parnell was met by the Mayor and Corporation, who presented him with an address. Bouquets were showered on the party. When the proceedings commenced in the park over fifty thousand people were present. The city and shipping were a mass of flags and bunting. During the formation of the procession at Blarney, a body of Fenians armed with revolvers, compelled two members of the Land League, Cronin and O'Brien, to leave their carriages, and kept them in custody till the proceedings were over. They intended to arrest the president of the League, but as he was in Parnell's carriage, they could not get at him. O'Brien and Cronin attempted to enter five different carriages but were prevented.

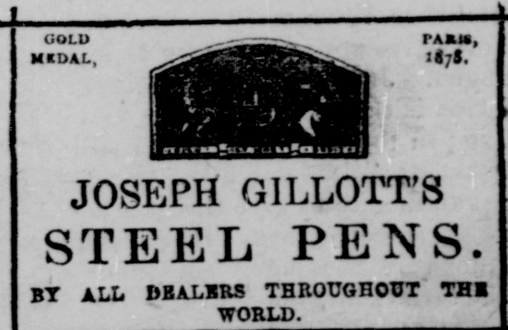
