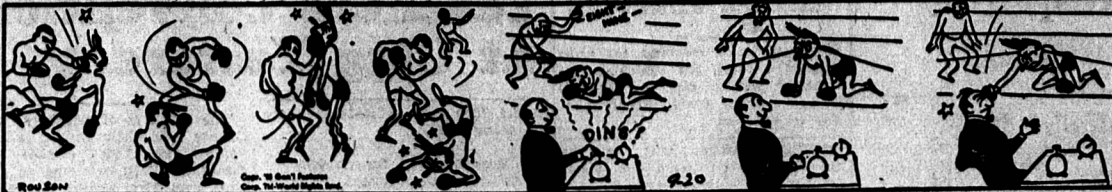

Island Baseball Finals To Resume Here Today

Semi-Final Play Today In Pro Tourney

The Island Intermediate "B" Baseball championship playoff finals for the Physical Fitness Trophy will get underway at the ball field at Miminegash this Sunday afternoon it was announced here officially yesterday. The series will be a best two out of three game clash between Miminegash and Peake's, the Prince and Queens County champions respectively.

The second game of the series will be held the following Sunday over the home field at Peake's and if a third game is necessary it will be played the same day as a double header event to decide the Provincial winner. Although the Intermediate "B" winners have the option of contesting the Intermediate "A" winners, now being played off between Summerside Curran and Briggs and Ment's Falcons, for the All-Province Intermediate crown, it is believed that the "B" group will not contest the strong opposition that they would have to contend with in the "A" section.

The Intermediate "B" groups have been playing smart ball in their respective County divisions this season with the Miminegash squad finally eliminating the Wellington nine for the Prince County title and Peake's winding up the King's County crown last Sunday when they made it three straight against Souris in the finals. There is expected to be plenty of action and some ball witnessed when the two County winners meet in the final series to climax a highly successful and competitive season of baseball.

Entries are rolling in daily for the Annual Interscholastic Track and Field Championships which will get underway here at Memorial Field on Saturday afternoon when athletes in both boys and girls divisions from schools all over the Province will compete for top Provincial honors. Team entries from nine schools had been received up until yesterday afternoon and many more are expected before the closing entry date. No individual entry count has been made yet by officials but it is expected to reach close to or even exceed last year's all-time high of 190 entries representative of 13 schools.

The team entries received from schools to date include O'Leary, Prince Street, Victoria, West Kent, Bedeque, Saint Eleanor's, Queen Square, Summerside, High and Glendale. The Department of Physical Fitness, the annual sponsors of the meet, stated yesterday that the final details of the meet are now being finalized and that a top-notch group of officials are being lined up to preside over the meet. Most of the officials will be the same competent ones that made such an outstanding job of running off the Maritime track and field championships held here on Labor Day.

Noted for its fine display of keen competitive sportsmanship, the meet will probably be the last of its kind to be witnessed here this season and contestants, officials and spectators are looking forward to another gala affair of sporting entertainment to wind up another banner year of activities in that department.

Prince Street School were the high point winners of last year's meet and they, among the many other schools will be turning out strong teams again this year, the former endeavouring to retain the honor and the latter vying to make it a new Provincial winner. Sportsmanship will be the keynote of the meet and a glowing example of this was demonstrated at last year's event.

According to the official scoring, both Queen Square and Prince Street had tied for top team honors with 41 points each. Following the conclusion of the meet, however, the faculty at Queen Square School found that one of their winning entrants had unknowingly competed in an event below his age group which gave the School the necessary points that tied the honors. In view of this, the Q. S. S. faculty immediately sent their apologies and explanations to the Prince Street staff, withdrawing any claim to the tie position and extending their congratulations to the latter school as the leading point winners.

Harkening back to a notation made in this column about the incident at that time it was the writer's view that "it will take a lot of research to find another such act in the records that will parallel this incident as an act of the highest order of fair play and good sportsmanship." That view still remains, and we will be looking forward to seeing the same display of goodwill and the assurance of knowing it will be there.

MacPherson edged Alan Ogilvie of New Glasgow's Abercrombie one up in the afternoon round played on a windwept course that kept par from being broken. Knox, who finished with the best score of the day—par 72—defeated Dowling in a thrilling match that was decided on the 16th green with the Lingan professional winning 4 and 2. Knox won the first two holes and was never headed. Sinclair and Halsall played one of the closest matches of the day with the Saint John player winning one up and having a medal score of 73, second best score of the day.

Harvey was the only golfer to win two matches today, defeating Thomas 5 and 4. Earlier the Lingan player rallied to oust Earl Jamieson of the Pines in a match that wasn't decided until the last hole. Harvey, one down at the 15th, birdied the 16th to square the match and won the last two holes with a par 5 and birdie 2 to win the bacon. A 36-hole medal play consolation round will be played tomorrow for all players defeated today.

Joe Louis Says Fight Will End In Knockout

POMPTON LAKES, N. J., Sept. 19 — (AP)—Joe Louis said today he doesn't expect his heavyweight championship fight with Ezzard Charles a week from tomorrow night to end in a decision. "It'll be a knockout one way or the other," he said firmly. "Charles, he stands and fights. He doesn't run away like Joe Walcott did."

The former champion boxed six rounds today with four sparring partners, and they all fed him a lot of leather. This left observers somewhat puzzled as to whether Joe was just getting himself toughened up to withstand Charles' punches or actually had lost much of his speed.

At any rate, Shamus O'Brien, Dutch Culbertson, Gene Felton and young Harry Willis took turns battling him around.

Charles Under-rated

SOUTH FALLSBURG, N. Y., Sept. 19 — (AP)—Ezzard Charles is the most under-rated fighter I know," declared Ray Robinson, the welterweight king, after watching Charles go through six rounds of boxing today in preparation for his Sept. 27 engagement with Joe Louis.

"Charles is in superb fighting condition," he observed. "I refuse to go out on a limb in predicting what the outcome of his fight with Joe Louis will be. But I'll say this much, Ezzard is very good to me and, I repeat, he's the most under-rated fighter I know."

Howard Takes Decision Over Jean Richard

HALIFAX, Sept. 18—(CP)—Dick (Kid) Howard, showing improvement after a United States tour, took a unanimous 10-round decision from Jean Richard of Montreal in the feature event of a boxing card here tonight.

Richard went into the ring at 186 1-2, a six and a half pound advantage over the Maritime lightweight champion.

Both fighters were in top form but there were no knockdowns. Richard's gloves touched the canvas in the 10th round as he was thrown off balance by the scrappy little Howard.

Tonight's fight was the fourth time that the Halifax boy and Richard have met. Howard took the first match and Richard the next two.

Howard appeared to have suffered the most damage over the 10-round route. His nose was red and swelling from Richard's jabs and the last round opened a small cut over his right eye.

In a six round semi-final, Bob Grace, 135 3-4, of Bridgewater, N. S., scored a knockout over Bob Gammon, 186 3-4, of Dartmouth, N. S., at the 2:20 mark of the third round. Gammon was solidly floored and was flat on his back when the referee reached the count of eight. He was on his feet as the count reached 10. The referee, however, raised Grace's arm in victory.

A four-round preliminary saw Bob Ledley, 147, of Dartmouth, N. S., knockout Lloyd Carr, 145 1-2, of Halifax at the 26 second mark of the second round. A second four-round preliminary saw Jimmy McKenzie, 129, of Halifax, score a decision over Bill Ivory, 129 1-2, of Dartmouth. McKenzie and Ivory battled from the opening bell and Ivory was bleeding badly from his left eye when the bout ended.

Yankees' Lead Sliced By Chicago Victory

Chicago's White Sox stopped the Yankees last night, ailing New York's American League lead to two percentage points over Detroit. Nelson Fox's two-run triple in the seventh inning did the damage to the Bronx Bombers' pennant hopes, giving Chicago the game 4-3.

Earlier in the day, Detroit blasted Philadelphia Athletics 12-4 to move back into a tie with Boston for second place. Charlie Keller and Pat Mullin went on a hitting spree as the Tigers blasted out 19 hits.

The Yankee loss, permitting both idle Boston and victorious Detroit to gain a half-game in the frenzied race, was doubly expensive because it cost them the services of Vic Raschi, their 30-game winning pitching ace.

Raschi, sailing along behind a 3-3 lead, suddenly left the game at the start of the last half of the seventh inning. It was announced that his arm "didn't feel right."

It was not known immediately if he would miss a turn.

Tom Ferrick, who took up the burden, failed. A single by Chico Carrasquel to left field with one out was followed by Gus Niarhos' booming double to left. Ferrick made Bob Cain ground out but Fox, a 239 hitter, poled a long triple to right centre between Joe DiMaggio and Hank Bauer. Before it could be retrieved, both runs were in. That was the ball game.

Joe DiMaggio's 31st homer in the fourth inning and Yogi Berra's 24th in the sixth with Phil Rizzuto on base gave the Yanks all their runs. But it wasn't enough to stand up after Raschi left.

Cain, the slender rookie southpaw who is making a career of beating the Yankees, did it for the fourth time. The Yankees have also added four losses to his 9-11 season record. The 25-year-old from Salina, Kansas, gave up only four hits, none after Berra's homer in the sixth.

Boston was rained out at Cleveland in the afternoon.

Keller, used solely as a pinch-

hitter up to yesterday, slammed four hits, including his first two home runs of the 1950 campaign, and batted in five runs.

Mullins, the Tigers' no. 2 pinch-hitter, had started only a couple of games, but he too made it a big day with a double and his second homer of the year.

The Tigers snapped out of their hitting slump with a bang as they boomed out 19 hits off three pitchers and led 11-0 at the end of five innings.
