PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND SCALE OF AMUSEMENT TAX
Approved by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council on the 31st day of May, 1951, under authority of "The Amusement Tax Act".
TO TAKE EFFECT ON JULY 1, 1951
The following tax is to be paid by all persons attending a place of amusement:
On a net price of admission of 12 cents or under— a tax of 2 cents
On a net price of admission from 13 cents to 16 cents, inclusive— a tax of 3 cents
On a net price of admission from 17 cents to 27 cents, inclusive— a tax of 4 cents
On a net price of admission from 28 cents to 35 cents, inclusive— a tax of 5 cents
On a net price of admission from 36 cents to 40 cents, inclusive— a tax of 8 cents
On a net price of admission from 41 cents to 47 cents, inclusive— a tax of 9 cents
On a net price of admission from 48 cents to 52 cents, inclusive— a tax of 10 cents
On a net price of admission from 53 cents to 57 cents, inclusive— a tax of 11 cents
On a net price of admission from 58 cents to 65 cents, inclusive— a tax of 13 cents
On a net price of admission from 66 cents to 75 cents, inclusive— a tax of 15 cents
On a net price of admission from 76 cents to 85 cents, inclusive— a tax of 17 cents
On a net price of admission from 86 cents to \$1 a tax of 20 cents
On a net price of admission over \$1.00— a tax of 25 cents
NOTE: The total admission will be the net price, plus the tax.
EXEMPTIONS
No Amusement Tax shall be payable with respect to the admission of children before five o'clock in the afternoon to theatre performances on any Saturday or statutory holiday, if the admission fee does not exceed 16 cents.
Persons admitted by "Pass" or "Complimentary Ticket" must pay tax on the maximum price of admission at the performance attended.
Any person entering a place of amusement WITHOUT PAYING THE TAX (excepting in the case of children on Saturday and Statutory Holidays), and any owner or employee of a place of amusement permitting any person so to enter, will be LIABLE TO A FINE as provided by Section 9 of said Act.
